The Israelites Cross the Red Sea Exodus 13:17–14:31

The first- and second-graders in your group are just beginning to feel somewhat independent. While they still rely heavily on the safety of home and family relationships, they're starting to value peer relationships. Since this lesson deals with fear, be sure not to let anyone ridicule a child for his or her fears. Use this lesson to emphasize that everyone has fears and that God is always there to help.

The Israelites Cross the Red Sea

Exodus 13:17-14:31

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Cares for His People

As the mass of more than 2 million Hebrews left Egypt, God knew that facing the warlike Philistines immediately would likely have made the Hebrews lose hope and turn back to Egypt. The pillar of cloud by day and pillar of fire by night must have been awesome and comforting.

God's Unusual Strategy

God instructed the Israelites to turn back somewhat toward Egypt and camp at a spot between Migdol and the Red Sea. God had a bigger plan than anyone else could know. Pharaoh would've been confident that he could easily defeat the Israelites.

The Israelites were slaves of the Egyptians only days prior to this event. They'd been beaten by the whips of the slave drivers and were familiar with the weapons the Egyptians carried. They must've realized that their fighting talents were nothing compared with the Egyptians'. And they were backed against the sea, with mountains on two sides and the Egyptians bearing down on them. The situation must've seemed hopeless.

God Shows His Power

We can realize that God had all this planned. He knew that the people would be frightened. He knew that they would doubt him. But he also knew that his power would be remembered forever. God knew that he would prevail, that the Hebrews would be saved from Pharaoh, and that the result would be a people growing greatly in their faith in him.

It may seem odd that no record of this event has been found in Egyptian history. However, it's likely that all records were wiped from the books because it would've been an embarrassment for the world to know that mighty Egypt had been devastated by its own lowly slaves.

The Jesus Connection

We live in troubled times when it's easy for people to lose heart and feel hopeless and lost. But a relationship with Jesus can give us peace and joy. Jesus is our light in dark times.

When have you felt out of sorts and desperate to find some control over your situation? Perhaps the Israelites felt these things after they escaped from Egypt. Although they may not have recognized it at the time, eventually they were able to look back and see how God used that time to protect them and bring glory to himself.

What part of your life might God have his hand in now? What can you do to connect with God during times of fear and desperation? Take a few minutes to reflect on God's hand in your life. Write your reflection here.

Let's Get Outta Here!

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together. Say: Let's play a game. You'll all start in one corner of our room. Indicate the starting corner according to your premade map. Then hand out the maps to kids and help them understand the map.

Say: We'll use these maps of our room to follow a path that just might lead us to something special. It's very important that we follow the map exactly in order to get to the surprise. Check for understanding, and then have kids gather with their maps at the starting corner.

Help the children navigate the map. When the children reach the difficult obstacle you placed along the path, invite them to return to the starting corner or to continue on. After kids reach the corner of the room where the treats are located, have them sit down, clean their hands, and eat.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What did you think about having to follow the path to get to the other corner of the room?

Why did you or didn't you decide to continue on when you met the obstacle?

Say: Just as we followed a curvy path with obstacles in our game, life can sometimes feel like that. We don't always know why our lives are going in certain ways, but we can be sure that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID or unsure about where our lives are going. Today we'll hear how God led his people in a new direction and protected them even when they were afraid.





God Guides the Israelites

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 13, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn how God led his people, the Israelites, when they were very scared. We'll learn that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

Show children the Bible Timeline, and point out "The Israelites Cross the Red Sea." Read aloud Exodus 13:17-22. Encourage kids to talk about times they've moved or traveled to places they'd never been before. Say: The Israelites were leaving a place they'd lived in all their lives. Even though life was very hard for them in Egypt, it was a scary situation for them to leave and go to a place they didn't know anything about.

Give each child a Lesson 1 My Bible Fun page. Say: **Even though it was a scary** situation, God was always with them. He was in the pillar of cloud and the pillar of fire, guiding them. Let's make a craft to represent these pillars.

Set out the supplies. Have kids cut out the "God's Pillars" section and glue their craft sticks to the "Pillar by Day" side. Have them glue cotton balls onto that side. Then have kids turn their "Pillars" over, rip up pieces of paper, and glue them to the "Pillar by Night" side.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think of the way God led the Israelites? What are some ways God leads or guides you? How does knowing that God leads you help you when you're afraid?

Say: Now you can take these pillars home to remind you that \blacktriangleright GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID, just as he helped the Israelites. Let's look at the rest of the Bible passage to find out what else God did for the Israelites.

God Parts the Red Sea

What You'll Do

Turn in your Bible to Exodus 14, and show kids the passage. Say: God told Moses to have the Israelites stop and camp for the night next to the Red Sea. God knew that the Pharaoh of Egypt would think the Israelites were lost in the desert and then chase after them. And that's just what happened.

Form two groups—the Israelites and the Egyptians. Say: **I need your help to tell what happened.** Lay the two sheets of blue poster board side by side near one end of the room. Have the Israelites sit next to them. Then have the Egyptians sit across the room.

Say: When the king of Egypt heard that the Israelites left, he thought, "Oh no! What have I done? Now all of our slaves are gone!" So he sent 600 of the best chariots to chase after the Israelites. Have the Egyptians pretend to ride chariots around the room. Then have them sit near the Israelites.

Say: The Bible says that the Israelites were terrified when they saw all the Egyptians coming toward them. Have the Israelites act scared with actions and words if they want to.

Say: When the Israelites realized they were being chased, they started blaming Moses, asking him, "What have you done? Why did you bring us here to die?" They were really scared, but they weren't thinking about the fact that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID. Encourage children to think about a time they were afraid as they all repeat the Bible Point together: ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

Say: Then God did something miraculous for the Israelites. He parted the Red Sea so the Israelites could walk across on dry land. Hold one of the blue poster boards so it's standing up but touching the ground. Have another adult volunteer or a child hold the other one in the same way so there's a narrow pathway. Then put down the poster boards, and show kids "The Israelites Cross the Red Sea" poster.

Say: Let's act out what happened. God helped the Israelites by telling Moses to stretch out his hand over the water. When Moses did just as God told him to, God parted the Red Sea so the Israelites could cross on dry land! Let's pretend to be Moses. Let the Israelites stretch out their arms. When kids do this, lift your poster board and have your helper do the same—letting the Israelites hurry through the opening.

Say: When the Egyptians tried to chase after the Israelites, God told Moses to stretch out his hand again. Have the Israelites stretch their hands toward the "Red Sea," and have the Egyptians enter into the path through the Red Sea (but not leave the pathway).

Say: This time, God caused all of the water to come crashing down on the **Egyptians so they couldn't chase the Israelites anymore!** Cover the Egyptians with the blue poster boards.

Let the children switch roles and briefly go through what happened again.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Lesson 1

What were you thinking when you were the Israelites in this situation? the Egyptians? What's so great about what God did? Tell about a time God did something great for you. How can what God did for the Israelites and us help when we're afraid?

Say: God did an amazing thing to help the Israelites when the Egyptians were chasing them. He had a plan all along. ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID, too. He knows what we're afraid of and always has a plan to take care of us.

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WEAVING FAITH

Where Is God When I'm Afraid?

What You'll Do

Say: Today we're hearing how God was with the Israelites in a really scary time and how ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID. Have kids form pairs.

Show the "Help, I'm Afraid" poster. Say: **On our poster are several pictures of kids in scary situations. I want you to look at these pictures and share with your partner which ones are the scariest for you.** Give kids time to share with each other. Invite the children to share some of the things they discussed in pairs.

Open your Bible to Psalm 23:4, and show it to kids. Say: There are times in our lives we're afraid, but we can know that God's always with us. Let's learn our Key Verse to help us remember that. Psalm 23:4 says, "I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me." Have children repeat the simplified verse with you several times: "I will fear no evil, for you are with me" (Psalm 23:4).

Think of a scary time. Allow time. "I will fear no evil, for you are with me" means that even when you're facing that really scary thing, you don't have to be afraid because God is right there with you. Have the children picture God with them in the scary time they previously thought of.

Say: Isn't it wonderful to know that we don't have to be afraid because God will take care of us? Let's learn a song to help us remember that God is always with us. Distribute copies of the lyrics page, and play "Psalm 23" (track 2 on the CD). Lead kids in singing and doing the motions.

Distribute index cards and crayons. Have kids each draw a picture of a time God helped them when they were afraid. Then say: In our Key Verse, God tells us that we don't need to be afraid because he is with us. I want you to pick out the one picture on the poster that you think is the scariest and tape your picture over it. Let kids put their cards over the pictures.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about knowing that God is always there for you? What can you do when you are afraid?

Say: Whenever you're afraid, ask God to comfort you. He's always there with you, and he hears you, so you just have to ask him. Just like God helped the Israelites, ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

God Sends Quail and Manna

Exodus 16:1-26

F irst- and second-graders usually can't comprehend the spiritual nature of God. They tend to think of God in terms of what their life experiences have taught them so far. For example, if their parents are very loving, they'll understand how God's love is infinitely greater. Children from troubled homes can be encouraged when they understand that God's love never fails and never ends. Use this lesson to ensure kids that God always gives them everything they need.

God Sends Quail and Manna

Exodus 16:1-26

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The People Become Hungry in the Wilderness

Approximately 30 days had passed since the Hebrew people left Egypt. Apparently the food they had brought with them had run out, and they began complaining. How quickly they had forgotten the oppression of the Egyptians! The people were just starting to get to know God, and they had very little framework to realize God would provide for them. This event marks a learning point for the Israelites.

God's Glory Shown to the People

We don't know exactly what "the glory of the Lord" was that the Israelites saw in the morning, but it was a visible sign to them (perhaps like the cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night mentioned in Exodus 13). God wanted Israel to know that he was still there, that he was aware of their need, and that he was going to provide for them.

God Provides for the People

When the manna appeared the first morning, the Hebrews' question "What is it?" apparently caught on as its name because manna means "What is it?" Though some have suggested various possibilities for what manna was, nothing we know of today is a good match for the description given in Exodus 16:31: "It was white like coriander seed and tasted like wafers made with honey."


The miraculous nature of manna is further exhibited in what happened to it over the course of a Sabbath as opposed to a weekday. The Israelites were not to work on the Sabbath but to keep it as a day for worship. Gathering manna on the Sabbath would have been work, so God simply didn't make it appear. If anyone tried to keep manna from one weekday to the next, it would spoil. However, if anyone kept it from the morning before the Sabbath, it would stay good through the Sabbath.

The Jesus Connection

God is our provider. Everything we have is from God, and he has provided a way for us to have a relationship with him through Jesus.

What do you find yourself wanting more than anything? How often do you view this desire as a need? It's important to recognize the difference. God allowed the Hebrews to live as slaves for many years. When God decided they needed to leave Egypt, he provided the miraculous opportunity to do so.

Our greatest need is to honor and glorify God. Regardless of our wants, we're fulfilled when living in God's will. Write a prayer here to glorify God for giving you what you need.

What Do You Need?

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together, and have kids sit in a circle.

Say: Let's play a game. One person will stand and tell one thing he or she needs. Then that person will point to another person in the circle, and he or she will stand and tell one thing he or she needs, and so on. Check that kids understand the difference between needs and wants. For example, you can explain that kids need water, but they want toys.

Start the game by standing and naming one thing you need. Then point to a child in the group. Continue in this manner until everyone has shared at least one need. Then say:
▶ GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED. In fact, all those things you named, God gave them to you. Everything your parents have, God gave to them. Everything anyone has that they need, God is the reason.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Why do you need some of the things you named? What do you think about God being the one who actually gives you everything you need?

Say: We learned in our game that there are things we need and things we just want. We heard a lot of things we each need in life and that \blacktriangleright GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED. Today we'll hear how the Israelites ran out of food but then God gave them what they needed.



People Grumble, God Provides

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 16:1-26, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible

today, we'll learn how God gave the Israelites food when they had nothing to eat, and we'll talk about how ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED.

Gather the children close together in a circle.

Say: In Exodus 16, the Israelites have left Egypt and are now in a place called the Desert of Sin. Let's read more about what they were doing.

Read aloud Exodus 16:1-3, and then say: **The Israelites were hungry, and they were grumbling and complaining. Let's grumble, too!**

Have kids wander around the room saying, "Grumble, grumble, grumble—I'm so hungry!" Let them wander for about 30 seconds, and then have them sit down again. Have kids tell partners about times they've grumbled to their parents or other adults.

Read aloud Exodus 16:4-5. Then say: **So Moses and Aaron told the people what God said. They told the people, "You are not grumbling against us, but against the Lord." Then they told the Israelites that God had heard their grumblings and that he would give them food.**

Have kids clean their hands. Give each child a plastic knife and a piece of bread on a foam plate.

Say: Just as God gave the Israelites food when they needed it, ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED. In the evening God gave the Israelites quail, which is a kind of bird. And every morning God gave the Israelites a kind of bread, which they called "manna." Let's make a snack that will remind us of the food God provided for the Israelites. Let kids spread honey on the bread in a bird shape and enjoy their snacks. (If there are leftover scraps, you may save them for the real birds.)

After kids have enjoyed their snacks, help them each make a second snack to take home to their parents. Say: **Give these to your parents, and thank them for giving you the things you need. Ask your parents to celebrate with you how God helps them provide for you.** Encourage kids to explain to their parents why they made birds out of honey on the bread. Cover the snacks with plastic wrap, and set them aside.

Say: God did something interesting when he gave the Israelites quail and manna. He gave them only enough food for one day at a time. He did that for five days, but on the sixth day, he gave them two days' worth of food so the Israelites wouldn't need to work one day of the week. God made it so if anyone tried to keep more food than he or she needed each day, it spoiled, and the person wasn't able to eat it, except on the sixth day.

Read aloud Exodus 16:35.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.





Ask:

What do you think about the Israelites' complaints? What do you think of how God responded? Tell about a time you felt impatient about waiting for food. Explain whether you think you could trust God to provide what you need every day.

Say: God kept his promise by providing food for the Israelites every morning and evening for 40 years! But God wanted them to rely on him each day, so he only gave them enough for each day. God wants us to rely on him, too, and we can always be certain that ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED.

My Cup Overflows

What You'll Do

Say: God wanted the Israelites to know every day that he's the one who gave them everything they needed. Let's look at our Key Verse and see what it says about how ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED.

Open your Bible to Psalm 23:5, and show it to kids. Say: Listen while I read Psalm 23:5 to you: "You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows" (Psalm 23:5). That means God takes care of us even when others aren't treating us well. God always gives us more than enough. Have kids repeat the verse with you several times: "You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows" (Psalm 23:5).

Give each child a Lesson 2 My Bible Fun page, and set out crayons. Say: Look at the table on your My Bible Fun page. Remember, our Key Verse tells us that God prepares a table for us. On the picture of the table, draw something God provides or gives to you.

Give kids several minutes to draw. Ensure children leave space to draw more on the table later in the activity. Then have kids share with partners about the things they drew on their tables.

Say: You all drew things God provides for you. Our Key Verse tells us that God provides for us in such a great way that our "cup overflows." The writer of this verse means that if he were to put all the blessings God gives him into a cup, the cup would overflow because God gives him so many good things!

Point out the cup on each child's My Bible Fun page. Say: **Think about something you feel extra thankful for that God's given you. Then write one word for that thing on the cup.** Allow time, and then have kids tell their partners how they feel that their cups are overflowing.

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Say: Draw on the table a picture of those good things flowing out of the cup. Allow time.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain how easy or hard it was to think of things God gives to you. What's something you need right now in your life? What are some ways you can show God you'll rely on him to give you what you need?

Say: \blacktriangleright GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED and even more. God loves each of us so much. He wants us to remember that he prepares a table for us and when we trust him, we'll see how our cups are overflowing with all the blessings he gives us. Let's trust God this week to provide for all our needs.



God Provides Today

What You'll Do

Have kids sit in a circle around the "God Provides" poster. Have kids sit where they can see the poster. Say: Today we learned that \blacktriangleright GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED. We heard how God gave the Israelites the food they needed every day, but even though they wanted to store extra food, he didn't let them because he wanted them to rely on him every day.

Point to the first picture on the "God Provides" poster. Have the group discuss whether they think the boy in the first picture needs the new toy.

Say: Let's listen to the CD and find out what happens here. Play "God Provides, Part 1" (track 3 on the CD). Then have the group discuss what they think the boy could do with all his extra toys.

Point to the second picture on the poster. Say: **Let's see what's happening with this little girl.** Play "God Provides, Part 2" (track 4 on the CD). Then have the group discuss whether they think the little girl needed the teddy bear that someone bought for her. Let kids tell about some things God's given them that they really wanted.

Say: God really loves you, and he wants to give you the things you need. But he also wants you to be happy. Because God sometimes gives us what we want as well as what we need, our cups overflow!

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God Provides Today Supplies

Point to the third picture on the poster. Say: **Let's listen to the next situation.** Play "God Provides, Part 3" (track 5 on the CD). Then have the group discuss what they think about how the girl reacted when her mom said "no."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about how the kids acted in each situation? Explain whether you think God gives us everything we want. How can you show God you're thankful for everything he gives you?

Say: ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED, and he even gives us some things we want. God hears our prayers. Sometimes we may not get exactly what we want, but we will get what we need. That's what God did for the Israelites. They might've liked having some food other than quail and manna, but they had food. They had what they needed.

Quail Cups

What You'll Do

Say: Let's make something now to help us remember what God did for the Israelites and what he does for us.

Set out the supplies and the "Quail Shapes" stencils. Let kids trace, cut out, and color quail shapes on construction paper. Have them glue the quail shapes to their cups. Help them write "God Provides" on their cups. Then have kids clean their hands and get in pairs.

Say: **Tell your partner about some things God's provided for you in the last year.** Allow time, and then as kids finish explaining, have each child take a handful of crackers to put in his or her cup.

Say: Now tell your partner what you can do this week to remember that God always gives you everything you need. Allow time, and then as kids finish explaining, let them each take another handful of crackers to put in the cup.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like filling your cup in this activity? When has God given you something that made you feel like your cup was overflowing?

Say: ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED—so much so that our cups overflow! Take your Quail Cups home as a reminder of how God provided for the Israelites by giving them quail and manna.

Say: Let's think about how SOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED.

Lead children in this discussion.

Say: Today we learned that God is so great that he gives us everything we need. We can always trust him to take care of us. This week, remember that ► GOD GIVES US WHAT WE NEED by following through on our Daily Challenges.

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about how God provides for our needs. Kids can also do the activities in the "HomeConnect" section of their My Bible Fun pages with their families.

Take a couple of minutes to pray with your kids, thanking God that he gives us everything we need and often gives us things we really want. Have kids stand in a circle and hold hands. Give each child a chance to tell God something he or she is thankful for, and then pray: God, you're amazing. We know we can trust you to give us what we need each day. Help us remember how wonderful you are and always thank you for how you always give us what we need. In Jesus' name, amen.

God Provides Water

Exodus 17:1-7

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Food and Whine

As we begin today's lesson, we find the Israelites continuing their journey toward the Promised Land. They're still getting manna every morning and quail every evening, but they can't find water at their latest campsite. It's important to take a moment to recall that the Israelites were just beginning to know God. This is the first time God had interacted with the Israelite community as a whole. Though this doesn't excuse their actions, it might give some context for us to see ourselves in more clearly.

Again, instead of calling in faith upon the God who had secured their freedom, turned bitter water sweet, and provided manna and quail, the people complained to Moses. Again, instead of trusting God, they lamented that they were going to die in the desert for lack of water. As you can see from Exodus 17:4, Moses was exasperated. God, however, proves his patience and love in this passage, giving the Hebrews the water they needed in spite of their complaining and their lack of faith.

Acting on Faith

God had a plan. His instructions to Moses must have seemed ludicrous! Moses was to take with him the leaders of the people—likely representatives from each tribe—so that they could see firsthand what God was going to do. In front of these leaders, Moses was to hit with his staff a rock that God would point out to him. And enough water would come out of the rock to take care of the needs of 2 million people. As unlikely as God's plan seemed, Moses didn't question God. He did what God told him to do, and God did what he said he would do. Moses and God gave a convincing demonstration of what acting on faith in God can do. And God was glorified when the leaders brought back their report.

Be Encouraged

The names Moses gave to the place where all this happened mean "temptation" and "murmuring." No doubt Moses' intent was to make this place a reminder of the people's unbelief but also an encouragement toward faith in the God who had provided for them.

The Jesus Connection

Think of someone who has frustrated you recently. What needs to happen to resolve the situation? A relationship with Jesus brings us forgiveness, not perfection. Pray for clarity and the opportunity to recognize when you need to extend the same type of grace and understanding that Jesus has given you. On the lines below, write a prayer for the person who has recently frustrated you.

Complaint Practice

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone in a circle.

Give each child a Lesson 3 My Bible Fun page. Say: Look at the picture at the top of the page, and find something in the picture you can complain about. Don't tell anyone what you find. For example, maybe something doesn't look quite right to you, or maybe you wish there were something else in the picture. Remember to keep your complaint a secret.

Allow time, and then encourage kids to act out the complaints as if they were people in the picture. As children act out their complaints one at a time, encourage the others to guess which part of the picture is being portrayed.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

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Lesson 3

What do people in your life do or say when you complain? Explain what you think about and feel when other people complain. What do you like about God's patience when you complain?

Say: Sometimes when people complain a lot, we get tired of listening. Your parents, teachers, or friends might get impatient when you complain. But ▶ GOD IS PATIENT WITH US, even when we complain. He listens to us, and he always gives us what we need. Let's hear how God was patient with some people in the Bible.

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BIBLE EXPLORATION

Camp Whack-a-Rock

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 17:1-7, and show kids the passage. Say: **In the Bible today,** we'll hear how the Israelites complained to God and God was patient with them.

Camp Whack-a-Rock Supplies

Bible

Say: Actually, what happened to a friend of mine was kind of like what happened with the Israelites. Let me tell you about it. Pause. But to make it more interesting, I'll need your help. Form two groups: the Israelites and the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids.

Say: Whenever I talk about the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids complaining, you'll pretend to complain if you're part of that group. And if I talk about the Israelites complaining, you'll pretend to complain if you're part of that group. For example, if I say one of the groups of people was complaining about being hungry, you could pretend to be hungry. Let's practice. Check that kids understand when their groups will pretend to complain, and then lead the children in complaining to be hungry. Kids can double over, hold their stomachs, and whine that they're starving.

Say: Let's see which group complains louder and more. Let's begin. My friend told me about a place called Camp Whack-a-Rock. When the kids showed up at Camp Whack-a-Rock, they were so happy to be there. They were glad to be away from home for a week, and there were lots of fun adventures to enjoy. They all smiled and laughed and sang.

Like at Camp Whack-a-Rock, in the Bible when the Israelites first left Egypt, they were happy to be free from slavery and the mean Pharaoh. They knew they were traveling to the Promised Land, and that was a wonderful thing.

But it wasn't long until things weren't so happy or carefree—and the complaining began. Allow about 15 seconds for all the kids to pretend to complain.

Say: At Camp Whack-a-Rock, it took just 15 minutes for trouble to start. When it started raining, all the kids started to complain. Prompt the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids to complain as if it's raining. Encourage them to be loud and silly as they complain.

Say: And the Israelites—it didn't take them long to start complaining either. It's true; the journey was hard. But Moses, their leader, got tired of all the complaining and didn't know what to do. Prompt the kids in the Israelite group to complain as if they're traveling on a long, hard journey.

Say: The camp counselor at Camp Whack-a-Rock, Morty, handed out rain ponchos, and the kids stopped complaining. But when they got to their cabins, the kids complained that the cabins were small, the beds were hard, and they'd have to use outhouses. Prompt the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids to complain.

Say: The Israelites continued to complain, too. They were very thirsty, and there was no water anywhere in sight. So they complained to Moses. They even blamed God for their troubles. Prompt the Israelites to complain.

Say: At Camp Whack-a-Rock, Morty decided to get the camp owner's help. He explained all the things the kids were complaining about, so the camp owner hired a construction crew to make the cabins bigger, to put soft mattresses on the beds, and to build a bathroom in every cabin. And then the kids stopped complaining. Prompt all the kids to be as quiet as possible.



Grades 1 & 2 Lesson 3 Fall Quarter



Say: Moses was really tired of listening to the Israelites complain, too. He didn't know how to get them water, so he talked to God. God told him, "Moses, I'll provide water for the people. Go to the rock at Horeb. Hit the rock with your staff, and water will come out of the rock." So Moses struck the rock with his staff, and water came out of the rock. The people drank all the water they needed, and they were thankful to God. Prompt all the kids to be as quiet as possible.

Say: So it seemed that the problems were solved. But after the campers at Camp Whack-a-Rock settled into their cabins, they started complaining again. Now they were hungry. Prompt the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids to complain.

Say: And the Israelites never stopped complaining for long either. Prompt the Israelites to complain.

Say: At Camp Whack-a-Rock, Morty asked the owner to help him again. The owner had all the kids come to the dining hall immediately. The cooks had prepared dinner early. At first the kids stopped complaining, but then they began again—they didn't want Brussels sprouts and lima beans! They wanted pizza. Prompt the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids to complain.

Say: The owner ordered pizza, which the campers liked. But they complained about their drinks. Prompt the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids to complain.

Say: Just like the Israelites, the Camp Whack-a-Rock kids complained a ton. Moses went to God for help, and Morty went to the camp owner. And while Moses and Morty become impatient with the people, God was always patient with the Israelites when they complained like the camp owner was with the kids.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

How were the Israelites and campers alike or not alike? What do you think about how the camp owner and God responded to the complaints?

Say: God was patient with the Israelites because he loved them. God loves us, too. ► GOD IS PATIENT WITH US, even when we complain. He takes care of us, even when we don't believe he will. This week, when we have complaints, let's remember that God always takes care of us.

The Lord Is My (Patient) Shepherd

What You'll Do

Say: We're learning today that God was patient with the Israelites, and \blacktriangleright GOD IS PATIENT WITH US, too. Even when the Israelites complained, God was patient and took care of them.

The Lord Is My (Patient) Shepherd Supplies

Bible CD player 1 copy per child of the lyrics page (at the end of the lesson) **Teacher Pack** CD: "Psalm 23" (track 2)

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Fall Quarter



Open your Bible to Psalm 23:1, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse today helps** us remember that God takes care of us. It says, "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters" (Psalm 23:1-2). A shepherd takes care of sheep, so our verse reminds us that God takes care of us. We don't need to worry or complain because he's always with us like a shepherd. Have kids repeat the simplified Key Verse with you several times: "The Lord is my shepherd" (Psalm 23:1).

A shepherd takes care of sheep, makes sure they have food and somewhere to sleep, leads them where they need to go, and helps them when they're sick or hurt. What are some ways God takes care of you and your family? Allow time.

Say: Thanks for sharing. Let's thank God now by singing a song about how he's our shepherd.

Distribute copies of the lyrics page, and play "Psalm 23" (track 2 on the CD). Lead kids in singing and doing the motions.

The Lord is my shepherd. (point up, and then pretend to hold a staff) (Repeat 4x.)

The Lord is my shepherd; (point up, and then pretend to hold a staff) I shall not be in want. (shake head no) He makes me lie down in green pastures. (stretch arms out to sides) He leads me beside quiet waters. (wiggle arms) He restores my soul. (touch heart) He restores my soul. (touch heart)

He guides me in paths of righteousness (put hand above eyes) For his name's sake. (point up) Even though I walk through the valley (walk in place) Of the shadow of death, (point down) I will fear no evil, for you are with me; (wave hands over and across each other) Your rod and your staff, they comfort me! (put hands on hips and nod)

You prepare a table before me (move hand across in front of body with palm up) In the presence of my enemies. (stomp foot) You anoint my head with oil; (touch head) My cup overflows. (lean to the side) My cup overflows. (lean to the side)

Surely goodness and love will follow me (touch heart) All the days of my life, (move hand across in front of body with palm up) And I will dwell in the house of the Lord (touch hands above head like a roof) Forever, forever! (shake hands above head)

The Lord is my shepherd. (point up, and then pretend to hold a staff) (Repeat 4x.)

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think and feel when you hear that God is your shepherd? Explain whether you think believing God takes care of you would keep you from complaining.

What things do you want to tell God now?

Say: God is our shepherd. He loves us and takes care of us. And he's very, very patient with us! God gives us what we need, too. In fact, God even gives us things we don't realize we need. It's important for us to remember that we can talk to God and that ► GOD IS PATIENT WITH US, always.

Distribute scissors, set out supplies, and have children cut the "Growth-Chart Banner" from the bottom of their My Bible Fun page. Say: **Decorate your Growth-Chart Banner. We're going to make growth charts to keep track of how we grow, and we'll put these on the tops of our growth charts.**

Encourage kids to draw pictures of times God has been patient with them and cared for them. They can draw them in the general areas where they think their heights might've been. For example, if they feel that God cared for them by giving them their specific parents, they could draw the picture between 1 and 2 feet to show how big they were when they were born.

Give each child a "Psalm 23" punch-out to put on his or her chart. Say: **Remember that** ► GOD IS PATIENT WITH US as we grow. He's our shepherd, and he cares for us as we grow and learn.

Use a hole punch to punch a hole in the top of each child's chart where indicated on the banner.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain one of your drawings about how God's been patient with you. Explain how you feel knowing that God is patient even when you complain. How can we show God that we're thankful for his patience?

Say: Take your growth chart home, and hang it on your wall. Every time you look at it, remember that \blacktriangleright GOD IS PATIENT WITH US as we grow. Thank God that he's patient with you, just as he was with the Israelites when they were in the desert.



God Gives the Ten Commandments (Part 1) Exodus 19:16–20:21

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

This week's Bible Background concentrates on the events surrounding the giving of the Ten Commandments, while next week's concentrates on the commandments themselves. You may want to read both Bible Backgrounds before beginning this lesson.

The Israelites Battle the Amalekites

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The Amalekites attacked the Israelites where they were camped. God had prepared the Israelites' faith for this test through his provision for them in so many ways. So the Israelites put together an army under the leadership of Joshua and went on the attack. Moses held high in the air the staff that had struck the rock to get water—"the staff of God." As long as Moses held the staff in the air, the Israelites continued to win—so Aaron and Hur helped hold Moses' hands up, and the Israelites defeated the Amalekites (Exodus 17:8-16).

Jethro Advises Moses to Focus on God

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Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, came to visit after the battle with the Amalekites. Seeing Moses burdened with judging disagreements among the 2 million Israelites, Jethro gave Moses some good advice. He suggested that Moses appoint judges to serve the people so that Moses could concentrate on what was most important—being the people's representative before God. Moses took the advice and then led the Israelites on to Mount Sinai, where Moses had previously met God in the burning bush. They arrived at Mount Sinai three months to the day from when they left Egypt (Exodus 18:5–19:2).

Moses Receives the Commandments From God

A significant event is recorded in the next few verses

(Exodus 19:3-9): God spoke to Moses and promised him that Israel would be his treasured possession, his holy people—if they would obey him. After Moses told the people what God had said, they responded gratefully: "We will do everything the Lord has said." God responded by telling Moses that God himself would come down and speak with the Israelites from a cloud.

The law God gave spelled out how the Israelites were to honor him through their obedience. In the thousands of years that have passed since this event, one thing hasn't changed: The best way we can honor God is by obeying him.

The Jesus Connection

Following Jesus is not about obeying rules; it's about knowing him. However, our obedience in honoring and glorifying God in our everyday lives allows our relationship with Jesus to grow.

What About Rules?

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Show kids the "Ten Commandments" poster. Lay the poster where the kids can see it.

Say: We have a brand-new game we're going to play today! Are you ready to play a new game? Great! First we have to make up some rules for this game.

Have kids form groups of three or four, and tell each group to think of a few rules for playing a game with the poster. Give groups a few minutes to think, and then let members of each group tell what rules they thought of.

Say: Now that we have all our rules, we can play! Remember to use all the rules each group mentioned. Allow a few minutes for kids to try playing the game with their rules.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to make up rules to a game? Explain how well it worked to play with all the rules from everyone. Why are good rules important? Why would you want to follow God's rules above anyone else's?

Say: It was silly playing our game with all your made-up rules. Sometimes in life, it might seem like there are so many different rules to follow. But we can always remember that what God asks us to do is what's best for us. That's why we want to obey what God asks us to do. And we ► HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM. Let's learn some of the things God asks of us.





To the Mountain!

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 19, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll hear how God gave us the Ten Commandments, and we'll learn why we ► HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM.

Show kids the Bible Timeline, and point out the "God Gives the Ten Commandments" section.

Say: Moses climbed up a big mountain to meet God and receive the Ten Commandments from him. Let's climb our own mountain and learn what some of the Ten Commandments are.

God told Moses that only he and Aaron could come up the mountain, called Mount Sinai. The rest of the people had to stay at the bottom of the mountain. Have the children gather around the mountain of pillows, and let them take turns pretending to be Moses and Aaron climbing the mountain.

Say: There was fire and smoke coming from Mount Sinai, and the mountain was trembling and shaking. Let the children shake the pillows to make the mountain tremble.

Say: Then there was a trumpet blast that got louder and louder, and then God spoke! Let's make a trumpet sound like that, and then we'll hear what God said. Lead the children in pretending to hold trumpets and blow them.

Read aloud Exodus 20:1-8. Then have kids form four groups, and number the groups one through four. Give each group one of the pieces of paper you prepared earlier, and set out the supplies.

Check that kids understand each commandment you read. Then say: **Each group will** draw a picture to show what one of the commandments we just heard means. Group One, you take the first commandment: God said we should have no other gods before him. Group Two, the second commandment: We should not worship idols. Group three: We should not misuse God's name. Group four: We should keep the Sabbath holy. Show kids the "God Gives the Ten Commandments" poster (from the Big Bible Poster Pack) so kids have a reminder for the first four commandments.

Circulate around the room to help kids as they decide what to draw. For example, for the first, they could create a big number one with "God" written on it. For the second, they could draw things that could be idols to people and then draw a circle around those things with a slash through it. For the third, they could draw something they can

do to use God's name in a good way, such as telling a friend about God or praying. For the fourth, they could draw a picture of things they do on the Sabbath that make God happy, like going to church, praying, or reading the Bible.

When groups are finished, let each share their drawings and tape them to the first four spots on the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain which of these commandments is the hardest for you to follow. What are some ways you can get God's help with obeying him? Why do you think it's important that we obey God's commandments? Why do you want to honor God in what you do and say?

Say: God loves us so much-that's why he gave us commandments. He knows what we need and what's best for us, so he gave us the commandments to help us have better lives. We can trust God and the things he asks of us. We want to do what God asks because we HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM.

How to Honor God

What You'll Do

Say: Today we're learning that we HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM. And we want to honor God because we love him and we know he loves and cares for us. Our Key Verse reminds us to love God, too.

Open your Bible to Deuteronomy 6:5, and show it to kids. Say: Our Key Verse says, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength." That means that God wants us to love him with all we have. Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength" (Deuteronomy 6:5).

Let's use motions to help us remember how God asks us to love him. Lead children in saying the verse and motioning in the following way: "Love the Lord your God (point up) With all your heart (put hand to heart) And with all your soul (hug self) And with all your strength" (make muscles) (Deuteronomy 6:5). (make an open book with hands)

Show the "Ten Commandments" poster. Say: Each of the commandments we learned about today can help us do what the Key Verse says: love God with all our heart, soul, and strength.

Point to the picture of each commandment on the poster as you name the commandments. Say: When we put God first in our lives, when we don't worship idols but worship only God, when we don't misuse God's name, and when we keep the Sabbath day holy, we're showing our love for God.

Give each child a Lesson 4 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "What Can I Do?" section. Say: **Circle the pictures that you think show things that honor God.** Allow a minute, and then let kids briefly share which pictures honor God.

Say: There are a lot of ways we can love and obey God every day. Let's make a craft to remind us to love and obey God all the time.

Give each child two red chenille wires. Then distribute scissors, and have kids cut out the four circles in the "Commandment Circles" section of the My Bible Fun page. As kids cut, punch holes in the tops of the circles for them.

Demonstrate how to thread two of the circles onto each of the two chenille wires. Once kids have attached two "Commandment Circles" to each chenille wire, show them how to twist the two chenille wires together at both ends. Let the children tell the first four commandments.

Say: **Remember, when we obey God's commandments, it's a way to love God.** Show kids how to bend the wires into the shape of a heart.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What are some ways you love God with all you have? Tell about a time you obeyed God.

How will you show your love for God this week?

Say: We ► HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM, and we show him we love him. God made us, he loves us, and he always takes care of us. Sometimes we forget these things—and when we do, we can also forget why we want to obey. But just as God asked the people in the Bible to obey, he wants us to obey his commands, too, because he knows they're for our best.

God Gives the Ten Commandments (Part 2) Exodus 19:16-20:21

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Last week's Bible Background concentrated on the events surrounding the giving of the Ten Commandments, while this week's concentrates on the commandments themselves. If you haven't already done so, you may want to read both of them before beginning this lesson.

Commandments With a Purpose

These commandments weren't given to force the Israelites to follow an arbitrary set of rules. These commands were intended to help the people live their lives to the fullest in relationship with one another.

With the death and resurrection of Jesus, we live no longer under the law but under grace. Jesus said he came to fulfill the law (Matthew 5:17-18). Certainly we are not bound to follow these laws to try to win God's favor, but the principles behind the Ten Commandments are valid principles for all time.

Commandments in Two Categories

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Over the centuries, scholars have divided the commandments into categories in varying ways. For the purpose of these studies, we're dividing them into two sections. The first four commandments have to do with our relationship with God; the last six have to do with our relationships with others.

God's Commandments Establish Priorities

The commandments regarding our relationship with God clearly spell out the priority and honor that he is to hold in our lives. How often—even in the Christian community—do we let other things come before our relationship with God?

One commandment that is often taken too lightly,

especially in today's culture, is the instruction not to misuse God's name. To use it in swearing or frivolously in joking is not appropriate. How we use God's name directly reflects how we feel about God. He and his name are worthy of all the honor we can muster!

The commandments regarding our relationships with others (Exodus 20:12-17) give us lots of guidance on how to respect others. Though even our Christian culture can fail to take many of these commands seriously, living by them gives people the honor and respect due them as unique creations of God. No matter what we see around us, we must hold true to these principles if we are to honor God and respect others the way God intends.

The Jesus Connection

As our relationship with Jesus grows, we can begin to see this world and other people through his eyes of unconditional love. We will enjoy fellowship more and others will see Jesus' presence in our lives.

God wants us to alter our lives to reflect our Savior who loves us enough to die for us. It's easy to get distracted, even by good things, and we can get caught up trying to be like other Christians more than we try to be like Jesus himself.

God loves his creation so much that he gave us commandments to help preserve it and glorify him. God's greatest creation is humanity—and we are surrounded by it. Every person you have contact with today gives you an opportunity to glorify God by lifting up his greatest creation—people. At the end of the day, take note of who God blessed through you and how you were blessed in his service. You can write your prayer in the space below.

Respect the Leader

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Say: Let's play a game that's kind of like Follow the Leader. Have kids get in one big circle. Invite one child to be the first leader. Have the leader stand in the center of the circle.

Say: The leader will choose one person to do or say something nice to another person in our group. For example, the leader could say, "Tell your neighbors something you like about them" or "Shake one neighbor's hand." After the leader gives one instruction, he or she must appoint a new leader by spinning around three times with one arm outstretched and the index finger pointing out. Whoever the leader is pointing to when he or she stops will be the new leader (as long as it's someone new). Play until everyone has a chance to be the leader.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to have to do what the leader told you? What were you thinking as you did nice things for your neighbors? How is that like or unlike how God wants us to treat others?

Say: In our game, our friends told us how to be nice to others. Like that, ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS. Today we'll learn the Ten Commandments that have to do with respecting others. Let's see what those commandments are!

Show the "God Gives the Ten Commandments" poster (from the Big Bible Poster Pack), and say: God gave Ten Commandments to us. The first four have to do with honoring him, and the other six have to do with respecting each other. What do you think it means to respect someone? Let several children answer.

Say: When we respect someone, we treat that person nicely. We treat that person the way we would want to be treated. But let's get more specific.

Read aloud Exodus 20:13-17. Then have kids form six groups, and give each group one of the pictures from the "Respecting Others" card.

Say: Look at your group's picture and talk about what you think is happening in the picture. Allow time.

Show the "Ten Commandments" poster. Briefly mention the first four commandments.

Say: The fifth commandment tells us to honor our fathers and mothers. Invite one child from the group with this card to share what his or her group discussed.

Ask:

What do you think it means to honor your father and your mother? What's easy or hard about always obeying your parents?

Say: It's not always easy to obey our parents, but obeying them is part of honoring them. God promises us that we'll "live long in the land" if we obey this commandment. So it must be really important to God for us to honor our parents. Invite the children to tell specific ways they can honor their parents. Then choose a child to attach the "Honor your father and mother" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Say: The next commandment tells us to not hurt others. In fact, this commandment says we shouldn't kill anyone.

Ask:

What kinds of things hurt others?

Say: God wants us to control our anger and be nice to others. He knows that's what's best for us. Invite the children to tell specific ways they can avoid hurting others. Then choose a child to attach the "Do not hurt others" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Say: The seventh commandment tells us not to commit adultery. God wants married people to be faithful to each other. He wants them to care for each other and treat each other with respect. You're a little young to worry about being married right now, so let's go on to the next commandment.

Choose a child to attach the "Do not commit adultery" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.





Say: Our next commandment tells us not to steal. When we take something that doesn't belong to us, that's called stealing. God gives each of us good gifts, and he doesn't want us to take what belongs to someone else.

Ask:

How can not stealing show respect for God?

Choose a child to attach the "Do not steal" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Say: The ninth commandment tells us not to lie. Okay, now be honest—you don't have to raise your hands or answer out loud—just think of your answer to this question: How many of you have ever lied? Pause.

Say: Lying can be an easy thing for some people to do. When you don't want to get in trouble or you don't want to do something, it can be a temptation to just lie your way out of it. But lying makes God very sad.

Ask:

How do you think lying could hurt someone? How is lying not showing respect to someone?

Choose a child to attach the "Do not lie" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Say: The last commandment tells us not to covet. That means God doesn't want us to be jealous about things other people have. To *covet* means you think a lot about that thing the other person has and wish you had it instead of them. God wants us to be thankful for everything he gives us, and he wants us to be happy when he gives others good gifts.

Ask:

Tell about something you wanted that belonged to someone else. What might you think or feel if someone wanted something you have? How might coveting keep you from respecting others?

Choose a child to attach the "Do not covet" card to the "Ten Commandments" poster.

Talk With Kids

Say: ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS. These commandments we've heard today give us great ways to show respect to others. Even though God gave them to the Israelites a long time ago, God still wants us to obey them today. Even today, they help us live good lives, full of joy.





I Will Respect Others

What You'll Do

Say: Today we're learning that ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS. And in our Key Verse, Jesus himself repeats the commandments we've talked about today. Let's look at the verse together.

Distribute Bibles, and help kids find Matthew 19:18-19. Read the verses aloud as kids follow along in their Bibles. Have the kids repeat the verses with you several times: " 'Do not murder, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not give false testimony, honor your father and mother,' and 'love your neighbor as yourself' " (Matthew 19:18-19).

Set out crayons. Give each child a Lesson 5 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "I Will Respect Others" section. Say: **Think about our Key Verse. What are some specific ways you can show respect to others?** Allow time.

Say: Choose one way that you feel God wants you to show respect to others this week, and draw a picture to remind yourself. Here are some ideas if kids are stumped:

Listen to your parents without talking back or complaining. Sincerely apologize to someone you hurt. Then do your best not to hurt that person this week. Tell each of your family members something you like about them.

Tell the truth all week, even if it's scary.

Play "Praise Him" (track 6 on the CD) as kids are working. A copy of the lyrics can be found at the end of the lesson.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

In what way does following God's commands help you?

Say: ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS because he made us and he knows what's best for us. Let's do our best to respect others this week by doing what God and Jesus ask us to do.

The Israelites Worship a Golden Calf Exodus 32:1-25

F irst- and second-graders can understand worship only in a limited sense; it's much easier for them to understand the concept of love. As children grow in their understanding of who God is and how much he loves them, their natural response will be one of worship. Use this lesson to help kids understand that although they can't see God, they can still be sure of his loving presence.



The Israelites Worship a Golden Calf

Exodus 32:1-25

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Out of Sight

Moses was up on the mountain for a long time receiving all the laws from God—almost six weeks (Exodus 24:18)! It's likely that the Israelites feared Moses had perished on the mountain. Since he had been their main contact with God, they may have reasoned that they had lost contact with God, too.

The Hebrews spent more than 400 years seeing "gods" in Egypt, and now they'd been asked to serve and follow a God they couldn't see. For the majority of the time they'd known God, he'd had personal relationships with individuals among them. They may not have realized God was interested in each of them individually and as an entire community.

They'd been camped in the same place for six weeks and were likely getting anxious to move on. They couldn't even see God's representative, so they fell back on what they were familiar with and asked for a god they could see who would continue to lead them.

What Was Aaron Thinking?


Aaron's willingness to go along suggests that he, too, had some doubt about Moses' return. However, some believe that Aaron's request for gold earrings was an attempt to avert the people's desire for a god. If they realized they had to give up things of value, they might decide they didn't really want a golden god after all. If that was Aaron's intent, his attempt failed.

After making the idol, Aaron's proclamation was that there'd be a "festival to the Lord." The name translated Lord (Yahweh) is the name by which God had announced himself to Moses at the burning bush. Apparently, Aaron thought that this idol could somehow represent the true God. Regardless of his motives, Aaron was wrong in making the idol. He led the people in disobeying God's second commandment (Exodus 20:4).

In talking to Moses, Aaron tried to make it seem as if he had no choice and that the fire itself had mysteriously shaped the calf. God's sparing of Aaron in this situation was certainly an example of his mercy and grace.

The Jesus Connection

We are surrounded by things that promise to bring us immediate pleasure and satisfaction. Many of these promises are deceitful, leading to destruction. But even God's blessings themselves can distract us from our true calling of worshipping God. Jesus came to offer the only thing that's truly worth having. Take a moment to write a prayer revealing your heart's desire to follow God and asking for his help in dislodging some things that might be stealing your worship away from God.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone in a circle.

Say: Let's think about what God is like. I'll roll a ball to someone in the circle. When the ball comes to you, say something about what God is like or something God does. For example, you might say, "God is strong" or "God loves me." When you've said something, roll the ball to someone else. Each person will name something about God. I'll start. Ready?

Name something about God, and then gently roll the ball to someone in the circle. If necessary, help the child think of a characteristic or action of God. Then encourage him or her to roll the ball to someone else. As kids roll the ball around the circle, help them think of characteristics and actions of God.

Ensure every child gets at least one turn. Continue until children seem to be running out of ideas.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What's your favorite thing about God? What are some ways we worship God? Why does God deserve our worship?

Say: No one else is like God. And because of who God is and what he does, ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. It's important that we don't worship anyone or anything else besides the real God. Today we'll hear about some people who worshipped something besides God. Let's hear what happened.





Let's Wait!

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 32:1-25, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn that God tells us not to worship anything or anyone except him.

The Bible tells us that God gave the Israelites the Ten Commandments to protect them and make their lives healthy and good. Let kids share some of the commandments if they remember any. Mention "You shall have no other gods before me" if it's not mentioned.

Say: God actually gave the Israelites' leader, Moses, the commandments so he could tell them to his people. God gave Moses the Ten Commandments when he was on the top of a mountain. But Moses was up there for a long time, and while the people were waiting and waiting for him to come back, they started getting really tired of waiting. Let's play a waiting game to see how they might've felt.

Explain that kids will close their eyes. When you say "go," kids should start silently waiting until they think a minute has passed. When they think a minute has passed, they can raise their hands and open their eyes, but they should still be silent in case other kids are still waiting. Give the starting signal. Use a stopwatch or a clock with a second hand to time one minute. After one minute, call time.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What were you thinking as you waited in this game? Tell about a time you waited for something for what seemed like a long time.

Why might God ask us to wait sometimes?

Say: Sometimes when we're waiting for something, it seems to take forever to get here. Maybe that's how the Israelites felt as they waited for Moses to come down from the mountain. In fact, they got so tired of waiting that they decided that maybe Moses wasn't coming back, and they decided to make an idol to worship. We might feel impatient for God to do things at times, too, but ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. Let's hear what happened with the Israelites.

What You'll Do

Say: The Israelites really did have to wait for a long time. Let's hear more about what they did when they got tired of waiting.

Play "We Can't Wait" (track 7 on the CD).

Say: Think about the Israelites and all their complaints. What kinds of things do you get impatient about? Let several children answer. After each child answers, have the whole group give a big groan.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to hear everyone groan and complain? What do you think about what the Israelites did? Why is God the only one you want to worship?

Say: The Israelites got so impatient that they tried to make their own god, and they worshipped that pretend god. But the truth is that our God is the only true God. And ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. He made us—not the other way around! We worship God because he's wonderful, he takes care of us, and he's the only true God.

The Golden Calf

What You'll Do

Say: God brought the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, but the Israelites seemed to forget that pretty quickly! Now they were tired of waiting for Moses, and they wanted a new god—one they made themselves. As silly as that sounds, that's what they wanted. Let's see what they did.

Give each child two small plastic bags. Help kids put a bag on each of their hands. Secure the bags on kids' hands with loose-fitting rubber bands.

Say: Here's how Aaron and the Israelites thought they could make their own god. First, Aaron told all the people to give him their gold earrings. We don't have gold earrings, but we do have gold caramel popcorn. Give each child some caramel popcorn on a napkin.

Say: Then Aaron took all of the earrings, and he melted the gold together. He made a golden calf, or baby cow, out of the melted gold. Have each child try to make a cow shape by squashing the popcorn together or by laying it out on the napkin. Then let kids take the bags off their hands, but have them wait to eat until you tell them to.

Lesson 6



Say: Our Key Verse today tells us that our God is the only one we should worship. Let's look at that passage. Open your Bible to Exodus 20:3, and show it to kids. Read the verse aloud: "You shall have no other gods before me." Lead kids in repeating the verse with you several times: "You shall have no other gods before me" (Exodus 20:3).

Say: Our Key Verse tells us that God wants us to worship only him. But the Israelites sure didn't obey that! When the people saw the golden calf, they decided to have a festival to celebrate and worship it. This made God very angry because ▶ ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. He told Moses to go down the mountain because the people were worshipping a golden calf. Thank the children for waiting, have them clean their hands, and allow them to eat the popcorn on their napkins.

Say: Moses went down the mountain and saw the people. Moses was so mad that he took the golden calf and burned it. Then he ground the pieces of gold into a powder and put the powder into water. Then Moses made the people drink the water with the gold powder in it.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain whether you think the golden calf you made was worth worshipping. Why might it be hurtful to the people for them to worship an idol rather than God? Why is worshipping God different from worshipping the golden calf?

Say: ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. There are no other gods, and it's wrong to worship anything or anyone other than God. It's also silly to worship something else—just like it would be silly for us to worship the popcorn cows. Instead, we worship our awesome God. Let's do that now!

What You'll Do

Say: Let's act on what we've learned today and worship God together. Remember, ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP, so let's focus on him, telling him how much we love him. Let's begin by singing a worship song.

Distribute copies of the lyrics page, and play "Praise Him" (track 6 on the CD). Lead children in singing and worshipping God as they choose. You may want to sing the song several times as the children get to know the lyrics.

The Israelites Build the Tabernacle

Exodus 35:4-36:38

BIBLE BACKGROUND

Generous Offerings

It was time for the Israelites to build a portable dwelling place for the worship of God. When Moses asked for contributions, the people gave generously. Apparently the events of the previous months inspired them to give to God. They may have realized how they had wronged God in worshipping the golden calf and wanted to do what they could to make amends for the damage done. They gave so generously that eventually they had to be told to stop bringing more materials (Exodus 36:6-7)!

One might wonder where these former slaves got gold and fine cloth to donate to the Tabernacle. The answer lies in the generosity of the Egyptians as the Israelites were escaping. God told the Hebrews to ask for things from the Egyptians; the Egyptians responded with silver, gold, and clothing (Exodus 12:35-36).

Talented Workers

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Not only did the Hebrews give things, but they gave time and talents as well. This passage singles out Bezalel and Oholiab as the leaders of the workers and also mentions women skilled in spinning goat hair (Exodus 35:26) and other skilled and willing people (Exodus 36:2).

Willing Worship

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What can we learn from this event? Serving God involves all kinds of different tasks and abilities. If you can't build a structure, maybe you can spin cloth. If you can't sing, maybe you can tell a co-worker about Jesus. Each one of us has God-given abilities and spiritual gifts. God wants us to use what he's given us to serve and honor him in whatever ways we can. God can use anyone to serve him and to further his kingdom here on earth. The only thing stopping our service to him is ourselves.

The Jesus Connection

Our relationship with Jesus gives us daily opportunities to serve him. He is our friend, our Creator, and our Savior. Service is a choice we make on a daily basis. But how often do you analyze your motives for serving? Wrong motives can rob us of blessings and limit our effectiveness in service.

For the Christian, service comes out of thankfulness for salvation and devotion to honor our Creator. If we are not serving for those reasons, perhaps we're really self-serving. Write a prayer here asking God to refine and hone your heart as you serve today and each day going forward.

Service Tour

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Say: Today we're going on a tour of the church. We'll stop and talk about what people do in several rooms. As we take our tour, think about how the different people serve God in our church. Also remember to respect others by being quiet so they can worship God.

Lead children on a tour of your church (include the outside of the building if weather permits). Stop at each room, and talk about how different people serve God in that room. For example, nursery teachers serve God by showing babies God's love and letting parents attend worship.

When your tour is complete, return to the meeting area. Invite the children to draw a diagram of your church on a large sheet of paper.

Lead children in recalling some of the things they discovered on your tour, and record their discoveries in the appropriate areas on the diagram of your church.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What surprised you about our tour? Why do you think there are so many different ways people can serve God? What are some ways you enjoy serving God?

Say: No matter who we are, ► WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD. God made each of us different, and he has a job for each of us. And no jobs are more important than others. No matter how God made us, we all can honor God in special ways.





Different but Equal

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Exodus 35, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn that ► WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD. In Exodus, we'll hear about God's people, the Israelites, and how they worked together using their talents and skills to serve God.

Show "The Israelites Build the Tabernacle" poster.

Play "Building the Tabernacle" (track 8 on the CD). Pause the CD when prompted, and say: **What types of things would you be able to do to help build a beautiful building?** Let several children answer. If they struggle to answer, you can suggest ideas such as painting, gathering materials, or making sure the workers have snacks and drinks when they need breaks.

Then say: **Tell about some other people you know who could help build a beautiful building.** Let several children answer. They may mention relatives who are construction workers, plumbers, electricians, seamstresses, or business owners with supplies.

Say: Let's hear what the Israelites did to help build the Tabernacle. As you listen, choose a motion to pretend you're helping, too. Check that every child has a motion, such as pretending to hammer, sew, or climb a ladder. Then continue playing "Building the Tabernacle" (track 8 on the CD).

Say: Everyone has things they're good at, and ▶ WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD. That's one thing the Israelites learned as they built the Tabernacle. Let's work together to build a tabernacle of our own.

Hang the "Tabernacle Plans" poster where everyone can see it. Set out one small and two large cardboard boxes, construction paper, and masking tape. If you have a large group, split your children into groups of 10 or fewer children and have them work in their groups to build separate tabernacles, and adjust your supplies accordingly.

Say: As we work together to create our tabernacle, everyone can help. Remember, we all have something to give to God's work. The poster on the wall will tell us the four things we need to do in order to build our tabernacle. Let's work together.

Encourage kids to work cooperatively as they build a tabernacle. Help them follow the four steps illustrated on the poster: creating the base of the building, making the ark of the covenant, installing the roof, and then finishing with a courtyard. Be sure all children participate in some way. As kids work, remind them that they're working together just as the Israelites worked together to build the Tabernacle.

When the tabernacle is complete, have kids clean up any leftover materials and then step back and form a circle around what they created.

Say: Look at that! These are the results of your hard work together. Each of you helped build the tabernacle in your own special way, just as the Israelites did. And each of you can serve God in your own special way.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

How did you use your talents to serve God in our activity today? Tell about another time you served God. What are some ways you think God wants you to serve in your family this week?

Say: We all had an opportunity to serve as we built our tabernacle today. God gives each one of us special talents that we can use to serve him. In fact, God wants us to serve him in everything we do. This week as we remember that ▶ WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD, let's try to serve our families and all those around us.

In All You Do

What You'll Do

Say: The Israelites used their skills to serve God, and we can, too. In fact, our Key Verse helps us think more about that.

Open your Bible to Colossians 3:17, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse today** tells us to use those skills to serve God in everything we do. It says, "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus." Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: "And whatever you do, whether in word or deed, do it all in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Colossians 3:17).

We have a song today that will help us remember the words to our Key Verse. I'll play it for you, and then we can all sing together.

Say: **Our Key Verse says, "whatever you do," just as our song did.** Invite the children to tell some things they do every day. Then give each child a pencil and a Lesson 7 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "In All You Do" activity.

Say: Let's make necklaces to remind us ► WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD, just as the Israelites did when they built the Tabernacle.

Have kids sit in a circle. Give each person a piece of string. Distribute beads to all the children, giving each child a different type of bead. Each child will need as many beads as there are children in the group.

Say: Let's make necklaces together. Place one of your beads on your piece of string. Then pass the string to the person on your right. As you receive a string from the person on your left, place one of your beads on that person's necklace. Then pass that necklace to the right. When the Israelites built the Tabernacle, they all put in what they could. This week, let's work together with others and put in what we can in the name of Jesus.

Say: **WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD. And we all have special tools we can use to do that. Let's think about some of the tools we can use to serve God.** Encourage kids to brainstorm ideas.

Say: If we all had the same exact talents and skills, it'd be hard to get things done. That's a reason God made all of us unique, kind of like how we made our toolboxes different. We can all work together to get things done, and God gives us all special purposes. ► WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD, just as the Israelites did.

The children in your group want to be first at all times, so it might seem foreign to them to think about being brave for God and standing up for him. Use this lesson to help children see that they are very important to God and that God wants them to be brave for him.

Moses Sends Spies Into the Promised Land Numbers 13:1–14:23

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Your Mission, Should You Choose to Accept It...

The spies were sent on an exploratory mission. The purpose was to see what kinds of opposition they'd be facing and if the land could support the Israelites as they conquered it. Moses' instructions were clear: They were to explore the land from the southern end all the way to the northern end.

Mission Impossible

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When the spies first returned, they simply reported what Moses had asked for. They told of the fruitfulness of the land, the powerful people, and the fortified cities (Numbers 13:26-29). But after Caleb spoke his mind, the other spies went beyond what they had been asked to do. They began to lament that there was no way they could defeat the people in the land. They exaggerated the reports of the size and strength of the land's inhabitants. The people responded by once again rebelling against Moses and against God. Once again God threatened to strike down all the people and begin again with Moses. And once again Moses interceded for the faithless Israelites.

The Faith of a Mustard Seed

Moses pointed out that what the Egyptians had learned about God through their recent experience would be nullified if God allowed the Israelites to die in the desert. Moses wanted everyone, including the Egyptians, to see God's power.

God once again forgave the Israelites. But notice he imposed a harsh punishment: No adults who were alive during the rebellion—except Joshua and Caleb—would be allowed to enter the Promised Land. Joshua and Caleb had faith that God could do what he said he would. Their faith enabled them to stand up for God, even when it was not the popular thing to do. Although their courage didn't convince anyone else to have faith, they were rewarded.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus Christ stood up for the world through his atoning sacrifice on the cross. Through our relationship with Christ, we can stand up for what we believe and who Jesus is.

Throughout history and all over the world, people have died because they professed a faith in Jesus Christ. While most of us do not experience persecution to this degree, non-Christians can be resentful of our claims to know the truth. These confrontations put Christians in a difficult situation.

Think about non-Christians you regularly come in contact with. Are you the same person with them that you are in front of this Sunday school group you're teaching? On the lines below, write a prayer that you will stand up for Jesus in your interactions with non-Christians.

Loyal Following

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Then tell children they're going to play Follow the Leader. Say: **I'll be the leader the first time, and then we'll switch so each person has a chance to be the leader.**

Lead children in playing Follow the Leader. If possible, go outside or to other areas in the building. As you lead, have kids go through a series of silly moves, such as jumping jacks, and more challenging maneuvers, such as crawling under chairs.

After a few minutes, appoint a child to be the leader. Continue to switch leaders every few minutes until everyone has had a chance to be the leader.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to follow each other in this game? Why does following someone sometimes require us to be brave? What do you think it means to be brave for God?

Say: Sometimes when we're following someone, we have to be brave. We have to be brave when we're asked to do something we're not used to doing, and we have to be brave by standing up for that person when others aren't. This week we'll learn how God's people were brave when he told them to do something risky. And we'll learn that we can ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD, too.

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Numbers 13, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn how God asked his people, the Israelites, to be brave for him.

Distribute pencils and paper, and say: **First let's hear what happened. As you listen, jot down one or two things that the spies were supposed to look for.** (If children can't write, encourage them to instead draw quick pictures that can serve as a reminder.)

Play "Canaan Spies, Part 1" (track 10 on the CD). Pause the CD when directed to do so, and ask kids to explain what they'd be most interested in spying on of the four things mentioned.

Continue playing the track. When the track is over, stop the CD and have kids explain what part of Canaan they'd be most excited about, based on what the spies said they found.

Say: Now that we've heard about the spies in the Bible, let's pretend to be spies and search for some hidden treasures, kind of like the spies did. Lead kids to the area where you hid the "Canaan Treasures" cards.

Say: As you pretend to be spies, look for the Canaan treasures. You'll find them on little picture cards that show grapes, a grassy land with trees, a strong man, or a building. Once you've found one, bring it to me. Encourage kids to find more than one if you have fewer than 20 children. When all the treasures are found, lead kids back to your meeting area.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to find the Canaan treasures you heard about? Tell about a promise someone made to you that came true. How were you brave as you waited for that promise to come true? Why would you want to be brave for God?

Say: The spies were excited about the fruit and the land they found in Canaan. But there were some other things about the Promised Land that they weren't so excited about—the people living there at the time. Sometimes as we do what God asks of us while we wait for his promises, we can \blacktriangleright BE BRAVE FOR GOD, too.

The Final Report

What You'll Do

Say: We heard about the brave spies and some of what they found, but we didn't hear much about the scary things in Canaan. Let's listen to their report now. As you listen, think about what sounds scariest to you.

Play "Canaan Spies, Part 2" (track 11 on the CD). Then let kids share what they thought sounded scariest about Canaan.

Say: Let's play a game to help us think about what the Israelites may have been going through. Have children stand in the center of the room. Point out the "No!" and "Yes!" signs hanging in your meeting area.

Say: I'll describe some people arguing. When you hear me say "yes," run to that side of the room (point to the "Yes!" sign) and stand under the "Yes!" sign. When you hear me say "no," run to that side of the room (point to the "No!" sign) and stand under the "No!" sign. Any questions? Check for understanding.

Say: After the spies told what they'd seen, the people still wondered whether they should move into Canaan. Caleb, one of the spies, said, "Yes! (Pause as kids run to the "Yes!" sign.) Let's move into Canaan. We can do it." Joshua, one of the other spies, agreed with him.

But all the other spies said, "No! (Pause as kids run to the "No!" sign.) No way. We can't attack those people. They're bigger and stronger than we are!"

So all the people became afraid and started to whine and complain. "God brought us all the way to this land, and now we're going to die," they cried. "Maybe we should just go back to Egypt. There we would be safe."

But Moses and Aaron and Caleb and Joshua said, "Yes! (Pause as kids run to the "Yes!" sign.) We can go into Canaan. We don't have to be afraid of those people. We need to be brave for God. God brought us to this land, and he wants us to have it. He's stronger than those people, so if we fight them, we'll win. Be brave for God!"

But the people refused to listen. They said, "No! (Pause as kids run to the "No!" sign.) We won't go!" They became very angry with Moses and Aaron and Caleb and Joshua. And they refused to move into Canaan.

And God became angry with the Israelites because they weren't loyal to him. So God said, "Because these people weren't loyal to me and didn't trust me, they will never go to the Promised Land. Only Joshua and Caleb will get to go to Canaan because they were loyal to me."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to run back and forth as you heard the different arguments? Tell about a time you weren't sure what to do because you were scared. How might God help you be brave in a time like that?

Say: Joshua and Caleb trusted God. They remembered how God had led the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt, and they trusted God's promise to give them this new land of Canaan. They were brave for God when the other spies doubted. Sometimes we face scary things in life that make us feel as if we're running back and forth, like in our game. But we can always do what God says and ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD because we know he's powerful and he'll help us do anything he asks us to do.





Standing Up

What You'll Do

Say: Today we're learning how God wants his people to be brave for him.

Have children form three groups. Be sure there is at least one strong reader in each group, or read the situations to groups yourself.

Say: Let's practice being brave for God in some pretend situations. First we'll learn our Key Verse to help us with being brave.

Open your Bible to 1 Corinthians 15:58, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse today encourages us to be brave. This is what it says: "Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you."** Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: **"Therefore, my dear brothers, stand firm. Let nothing move you" (1 Corinthians 15:58).**

The Bible tells us to always stand firm for God and to let nothing move us. That means that we can always ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD and not let anyone talk us out of it. It's just like how Joshua and Caleb stood up for God. No matter what the other spies said, Joshua and Caleb were brave because they knew God was bringing them into their Promised Land.

Let's practice standing up for God, just as Joshua and Caleb did. Give each child a Lesson 8 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "Be Brave for God!" activity.

Give each group one of the situations described on the page. If you have mostly firstgraders, go from group to group and explain the situations to the children.

Say: In your group, look at the situation I gave you. Then practice acting out the situation. In a few minutes, we'll act out the situations for each other and try to come up with ways to stand up for God in those situations. If possible, have an adult leader help each group in this activity.

After a few minutes of reading and practicing their situations, have groups act out the situations for each other.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What did you think about the situations we acted out? Tell about a time you had to be brave to do the right thing. Why do you want to be brave for God?

Balaam's Donkey Talks

Numbers 22:1-38

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The Fortuneteller

This event takes place near the end of the Israelites' time of wandering in the desert. They had defeated a few adversaries in their travels and were approaching the Promised Land again. The leader of Moab was afraid of what Israel might do to his land, so he sought the help of Balaam.

Apparently Balaam was a widely known fortuneteller, or diviner, who made his living through his divination. He probably believed in many gods and would consult anyone, including the Lord, who could help him earn his fees.

A Wrong Motive

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Even though Balaam called upon the Lord and spoke God's words to the people sent by Balak, Balaam's underlying motive was for selfish gain.

When God had told Balaam "no" the first time, Balaam should have taken that as a final answer. But when Balaam came back to God a second time, it was clear that Balaam's desire for financial gain was greater than his desire to do what God told him. In letting Balaam go but not letting him do anything that would please Balak, God was showing how he disliked Balaam's money-hungry attitude.

God let Balaam go with Balak's men, but God was angry because he knew that Balaam was acting from self-interest and greed.

A Talking Donkey?

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Not being able to see the angel his donkey saw must have been a huge insult to Balaam, who prided himself on knowing and seeing spiritual things. Certainly Balaam was humiliated when the donkey had to speak in order to get him to see reality. Balaam had been blinded by his desire for riches. God finally opened his eyes to the angel standing in the path and to the evil of what Balaam had been doing.

Speaking God's Words

After getting Balaam's attention through the donkey and the angel, God let Balaam know that he wanted Balaam to go through with his trip but to speak only what God said. This whole event was intended to help Balaam think clearly and to know that he had to do what God told him.

The Jesus Connection

God is always doing things in us and through us, but we can sometimes forget that and stop paying attention to him. When we let our focus stay on God, we can be used more easily by him. Write the most recent thing you can remember that helped you see God at work. Ask God to help you pay attention to him in the big and small things in your life. You can write your prayer on the lines below.

Amazing Stories

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Ask kids to form small groups of three or four. Say: **Take turns telling the other people** in your group about something amazing you've seen or experienced. Maybe you've seen an amazing wild animal, or maybe you won a game you didn't think you could win.

As children are sharing, circulate among the groups, helping them stay on task, listen to one another, and keep their stories concise.

When everyone has had the opportunity to share, ask a few willing children to share short versions of what they talked about. Then ask everyone to come together as a large group.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to see or experience these amazing things? What were you thinking or feeling as you told each other about these amazing things? What did you learn from hearing other people's experiences? What kinds of amazing things does God do?

Say: We had some pretty great experiences to share in our group. When amazing things happen, they really do stay with us for a long time. Today we're learning that when we ▶ PAY ATTENTION TO GOD, we see that God does really amazing things! We'll hear about some amazing things God's people saw when they paid attention to God.





An Amazing Surprise

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Numbers 22, and show kids the passage. Say: **Today we'll learn** that the Bible tells us to ▶ PAY ATTENTION TO GOD. Let's hear what happened with God's people, the Israelites, when they learned just that!

Show the Bible Timeline, and point out the "Balaam's Donkey Talks" section.

Say: While the Israelites were traveling to the Promised Land, they stopped near a place called Moab. The people who lived in Moab were afraid when they saw all the Israelites because there were so many! They were afraid the Israelites would take everything they had. So the leader of Moab asked a man named Balaam to come to Moab and say bad things about the Israelites so the Israelites would go away. Pause and encourage the kids to share what they think about the Moabites' plan so far.

Say: Remember, the Israelites were God's people, and God had told them to travel in that direction. So God told Balaam not to say bad things about the Israelites because God had blessed them. Pause and encourage kids to discuss Balaam's choices in this situation and decide what choice seems like the best idea.

Say: Balaam told the leaders of Moab to leave him alone. They kept asking him, though, so finally God told Balaam, "Go to Moab, but only do what I tell you to do." So Balaam rode his donkey to Moab.

Let's quietly and slowly travel back and forth across this room just as Balaam traveled to Moab. While you're traveling, be sure to keep listening. Lead children in walking quietly and slowly back and forth across the room as you continue telling what happened.

Say: God knew that if Balaam saw God's power, it would remind Balaam to obey God. So he sent an angel to stand in Balaam's way as he was traveling to Moab. At first Balaam didn't see the angel standing in the middle of the road in front of him, but his donkey saw the angel. The donkey was surprised, so she turned off the road to avoid the angel. Instruct children to stop "traveling" and stand in one place.

Say: This made Balaam angry, so he hit the donkey and kept going. Instruct children to begin traveling again.

Say: Again the angel stood in the way, and again the donkey turned to avoid the angel. This time, there was a wall next to the path, so when the donkey turned, she crushed Balaam's foot against the wall. Instruct children to stop traveling and stand in one place.



An Amazing Surprise Supplies

Say: Balaam was really mad this time, and he hit his donkey again and kept going. Instruct children to begin traveling again.

Say: Again the angel stood in the way, but this time there was nowhere for the donkey to go because the path was very narrow. So the donkey lay down! Instruct children to stop traveling and sit on the floor.

Say: Well, this made Balaam very angry, and he hit his donkey again.

Now let's play a game to think about what happened to the donkey. We'll take turns traveling across the room like we were before, but this time everyone else will surprise you and try to stop you from traveling, just as the angel did.

Have each child take a turn traveling across the room while the rest of the group tries to stop him or her with surprises. Be sure kids don't touch each other or intimidate one another. Allow each child to make one trip across the room before someone else takes a turn.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about how God stopped Balaam? What was it like to be surprised and stopped on your journey? Tell about a time you or someone you know stopped doing something because of God.

Why is it important to pay attention to God?

Say: Like it was for Balaam, it's really important that we PAY ATTENTION TO GOD. God does amazing things to show his power, but sometimes if we're not paying attention, we can miss it at first, or maybe all together. Or God might get us to pay attention kind of like we experienced in our game. God has a plan and purpose for each of us, so we want to listen to him and do what he tells us to do.

Donkey Puppets

What You'll Do

Say: We're learning to PAY ATTENTION TO GOD today. So far we've heard how God got Balaam's attention by putting an angel in the road. But God did something even more amazing than that. He made the donkey talk! Before we hear exactly what happened, let's make donkey puppets to use as we listen.

Show the "Balaam's Donkey Talks" poster.

Give each child a small paper bag. Place a bag on your hand and demonstrate for kids where to put the eyes, noses, mouths, and ears of their donkeys. Show kids how to trace two donkey-ear stencils on gray construction paper and one donkey tongue on pink construction paper. Let kids embellish their puppets with yarn "hair," too.

After kids finish making their donkeys, gather everyone in a semicircle.

Say: Every time you hear me say, "And then the donkey said..." have your donkey say, "Heehaw! Heehaw!" Let's practice. Lead kids in practicing the response a few times.

Say: After the third time Balaam hit his donkey, the donkey turned around to look at Balaam. And then the donkey said...Pause for kids to respond. "Why did you hit me? What did I do to you?"

Balaam said to his donkey, "You made a fool of me! If I had a sword, I'd kill you!"

The donkey thought about that for a second or two. And then the donkey said... Pause for kids to respond. "Am I not your very own donkey?"

Balaam, who was still very mad, said, "Yes! Of course you're my very own donkey! What does that have to do with anything?"

And then the donkey said...Pause for kids to respond. "Well, since I'm your very own donkey, that means that I'm the donkey you've always ridden, right? Right up to this very day?"

And Balaam answered, "Yes! You're my very own donkey, and you're the donkey l've always ridden. Right up until today. So what?"

And then the donkey said...Pause for kids to respond. "Think about it, Balaam. I'm your very own donkey, the one that you've always ridden. Let me ask you one very important question: Have I done this to you before?"

Balaam thought for a minute and then said, "Well, no." Then, all of a sudden, Balaam was able to see the angel standing in the road. The angel was holding a sword and blocking the road. Balaam bowed down before the angel.

The angel asked Balaam, "Why did you hit your donkey? I've come here to show you that you should take God seriously. The donkey saw me three times and turned away."

Say: Then the donkey said ... Pause for kids to respond. "That's right, I did!"

The angel continued. "Now go on your journey, but make sure you only say what God tells you to say."

So Balaam went to Moab, realizing that he could do only what God told him to do. When he got there, he didn't curse the Israelites.

Have kids remove their puppets from their hands.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about the talking donkey and the angel? Tell about a way you think God gets your attention or that of someone else you know.

Say: When God made Balaam's donkey talk, he showed Balaam his power. And God does amazing things to show his power to us, too. When we see God do amazing things, let's stop what we're doing right away and ▶ PAY ATTENTION TO GOD.

Come and See!

What You'll Do

Say: Today we're learning to PAY ATTENTION TO GOD. We heard how God did amazing things to get Balaam's attention, and he'll do amazing things in our lives, too.

The Bible tells us all kinds of amazing things Jesus did, like healing sick people, bringing people back to life, and feeding thousands of people on a small amount of bread and fish. When Jesus did these things, people paid attention. Let kids talk about other amazing things Jesus did or things Jesus has done in their lives.

Open your Bible to Psalm 66:5, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse today is about the amazing things God does. Listen while I read what it says: "Come and see what God has done, how awesome his works in man's behalf!" That means God wants us to pay attention to how he does awesome things to take care of us and lead us.** Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: **"Come and see what God has done, how awesome his works in man's behalf!" (Psalm 66:5).**

Then have kids form pairs, and let them practice saying the verse using the donkey puppets. After a minute, let them show the rest of the group what they came up with.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think or feel about God doing amazing things? What can you do this week to pay attention to God?

Say: We PAY ATTENTION TO GOD because God loves us. We know that he does amazing things, just like he did with Balaam, and we want to pay attention so we can know how God wants us to respond right away.

Say: God does amazing things to get our attention and to take care of us. Let's make thank-you cards for God to let him know we're paying attention and we want to thank him for how he leads us.

Give each child a pencil, some crayons, and a Lesson 9 My Bible Fun page. Point out the "Thank-You Card" section.

Say: Think about some amazing things God has done in your life. Maybe he healed a sick relative or helped you make a new friend when you moved to a new place. Write or draw those amazing things on your thank-you card as a way to tell God how much you appreciate what he's done.

Encourage kids to have fun filling their thank-you cards with pictures or descriptions of amazing things God has done to show his power in their lives. As kids are working, play "Psalm 23" (track 2 on the CD). See the end of this lesson for a copy of the lyrics.

When kids finish drawing or writing, gather everyone in a circle. Invite children to briefly display their cards.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What's helpful about knowing that God is powerful? How will you thank God for the amazing things he does?

Joshua Becomes Leader of Israel

Joshua 1:1-11

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God With You

As we begin this passage, Moses had died and Joshua had taken over the leadership of the Israelites, as had been arranged in advance (Deuteronomy 31:1-8). Joshua 1:5 tells us that God was going to be with Joshua in the same way he had been with Moses.

God at Work Through You

The question may arise: Why was it okay for the Israelites to kill other people and take away their land? This is a complicated question. However, one point seems apparent: God was using Israel to judge the immoral people who lived in the land at the time. Just as Israel was later defeated and their land taken away because of sin, so God was using Israel as an instrument of punishment, taking away the land of the Canaanites because of their sin.

God's Plan for You

In this passage God gave Joshua a command of encouragement ("Be strong and courageous"), a condition for success ("obey all the law my servant Moses gave you"), and a promise of his presence ("the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go"). God had a plan for Israel, and Joshua was the instrument through which he was going to accomplish that plan.

God Goes Before You

What more could Joshua ask for? All he had to do was follow what God laid out for him, and God would be there to assure his success. However unsure or discouraged Joshua might have been at the death of Moses, this visit from God rejuvenated him. The first thing recorded after God's message to him is Joshua's ordering the leaders to get the people ready to cross the Jordan. The Israelites were ready to move into the Promised Land, and God was going to give them the land.

The Jesus Connection

Our plans and God's plans don't always match. We want to be happy now; God wants to give us greater joy as we surrender our lives to his service. When we commit our lives to Christ, he uses us to accomplish his mission. God promises the same thing to us that he promised to Joshua: He'll be with us all the time. On the lines below, write a prayer about one area of your life in which you need to know God is with you.

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Say: Today we'll learn that ► GOD IS WITH US.

Darken your meeting area somewhat so children will be able to see their shadows. Shine a large, powerful flashlight on them. Point out children's shadows, and encourage them to have fun experimenting with the shadows, making fun shapes and gestures.

Say: Our shadows stick closely with us when the light is on, but they disappear as soon as the light goes off.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Say: Unlike our shadows, which disappear as soon as the light goes off, \blacktriangleright GOD IS WITH US—always. Even though we can't see him, God helps us accomplish his plans by being with us. Because he's with us all the time, he gives us strength and courage to do what he wants us to do. In the Bible today, we'll meet someone who God had big plans for. Let's get started!

Open your Bible to Joshua 1, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn about a plan that God had for a man named Joshua.

Fall Quarter

Give each child a marker and a Lesson 10 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "Joshua's Feelings" section.

Say: As we listen today, we'll stop a few times. When we stop, you'll draw on your My Bible Fun page what Joshua could've looked like at that time. Are you ready? Let's listen!

Play "Joshua Takes Over" (track 12 on the CD). Pause the CD as directed on the track, and encourage children to record on the faces on the "Joshua's Feelings" section of their student pages what they think Joshua could've looked like at that point.

Say: Moses, the leader of the Israelites, died because he grew very old. After his death, God told Joshua that Joshua would be the leader of the Israelites now, and he would take them into the Promised Land. Have kids tell about different times they've been leaders in their lives. Maybe they led a game or are leaders with their siblings at home.

Say: God didn't leave Joshua to lead the people on his own. God told Joshua he would be with him. God promised he would help Joshua and the Israelites conquer the land of Canaan so they could live there. God said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you...Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go."

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What might've been scary about becoming the leader of God's people? Tell about someone or something you might feel hesitant to lead. How might knowing God's always with you help you?

Say: Just as God was with Joshua, \blacktriangleright GOD IS WITH US. God helps us accomplish his plans every day. And since we can trust God to be with us all the time, we don't have to be afraid. Let's talk a little more about God's help.

Cut apart the segments on the "Comic Book Covers" poster. Cut 5 pieces of paper per child the same size as one "Comic Book Cover."

Grades 1 & 2 Lesson 10



Give each child five pieces of paper the same size as one "Comic Book Cover," and set out supplies. Say: On the paper I gave you, create pictures of yourself accomplishing God's plans with his help. Then we'll put all the pages together to create comic books.

Let's start by brainstorming some ways we can accomplish God's plans. For example, we accomplish God's plans when we're nice to other people even when we don't have that much in common with them. Or God helps us accomplish his plans when he helps us say no to cheating, even if our friends are doing it. What are some other ideas? Help kids brainstorm ways they can accomplish God's plans with God's help. As they name ideas, list them somewhere for kids to see.

Say: Now on one of your pieces of paper, create a picture of a time God helped you accomplish his plans in your family.

If kids need ideas, encourage them to use the ideas on the list they created. Then have kids create pictures on three other pieces of paper: accomplishing God's plans at school, accomplishing God's plans at church, and a depiction of what plans they think God might have for them when they grow up, just as God had plans for Joshua.

Play "Wherever You Go" (Joshua 1:9) (track 13 on the CD) as children work.

When kids finish drawing and coloring, ask them to display their pages for each other, describing how God helped them in the scenes they depicted. Then give each person a segment from the "Comic Book Covers" poster. Direct children to fill in their names on the covers and glue them to the fifth sheet of paper, which will be the comic book cover. Help children staple their books together with the covers on the front.

Say: When you leave today, take your comic book home as a reminder of how God has helped you accomplish his plans.

Open your Bible to Joshua 1:9, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse for today** talks about how God is always with us. Listen while I read it: "God will be with you wherever you go." Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: "God will be with you wherever you go" (Joshua 1:9).

This verse tells us that no matter where we are or where we go, God will be with us. God told Joshua not to be afraid because God would always be with him, helping him accomplish God's plans. Let's sing a song about that.

Distribute copies of the lyrics page, and lead children in singing "Wherever You Go" (Joshua 1:9) (track 13 on the CD).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

How can we remember that God is always with us?

Say: \blacktriangleright GOD IS WITH US, and he helps us have the courage and strength we need to accomplish his plans. God also guides us and shows us the right things to do, just as he did for Joshua. Let's look to God this week when we're afraid or lonely or we don't know what to do.

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think about how SOD IS WITH US.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges in their My Bible Fun pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

Joshua Sends Spies to Jericho

Joshua 2:1-24

F irst- and second-graders have no trouble believing in things they can't see, even if they can't completely understand spirituality. The example of Rahab's faith can be encouraging to kids as they see a woman who had little literal understanding of God but was still able to use her faith in a powerful way. Use this lesson to direct kids' faith to the one true God and what he can and will do in their lives.

Joshua Sends Spies to Jericho

Joshua 2:1-24

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

A Different Method

As Joshua prepared to send spies into the Promised Land, no doubt he remembered the fiasco of 40 years earlier when Moses sent a large group of spies into the land. This time Joshua sent only two and gave them a very specific mission: Investigate Jericho. He sent them "secretly," not wanting the Canaanites to know what they were doing and probably also to protect the Israelites from the distressful result of the first spy mission.

Good Gossip

It may seem suspicious that the place the spies went was to the home of a prostitute. However, it's likely that this was a place where gossip would abound. In addition, the word most often translated "prostitute" can just as accurately be translated "innkeeper." Either way, it was a place where the spies were able to hear and gauge how the people of Jericho felt about the Israelites who were camped just across the Jordan River.

A Woman of Faith

••••••

Rahab, though she lied about hiding the spies in her house, had apparently become a believer in God through what she had heard about the Israelites' experiences and conquests. She hid the men at great personal risk. She was commended for her strong faith in the New Testament in Hebrews 11:31. Note that God did not commend her for lying but for acting in faith and hiding the spies. God blessed her for that faith.

The end of this event lies beyond the scope of today's passage. During the victory over Jericho, Rahab and her family were indeed spared from death (Joshua 6:17). Moreover, the New Testament attests

to her faithfulness and includes her in the line of King David and of Jesus (Matthew 1:5)!

The Jesus Connection

Rahab's faith landed her among Jesus' ancestors. When we venture forth with a small act of faith, God responds and shows us his much larger faithfulness. In what areas of your life would you like to show more faithfulness to God? What are some ways you've seen God's faithfulness to you? You can write your prayer asking God to use you to do big things. There's nothing too big for the God of the universe who wants to lead and guide your life.

Do You Believe It?

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Say: Today we'll talk about faith. The Bible says faith is being sure of things we don't see. Let's think of what it's like to be sure of things we don't see as we listen to some news reports.

Play "News Report, Part 1" (track 14 on the CD). After listening, lead the children in talking about whether they believe what they hear on the news and how they know they can believe the news reports.

Play "News Report, Part 2" (track 15 on the CD). After listening, lead the children in talking about whether they've see the prince of England and how they know he's real even if they haven't seen him in person. Ask the children to discuss how they know princes are real, even if they've never seen or met one.

Play "News Report, Part 3" (track 16 on the CD).

Say: That news report was from a faraway place and a faraway time. In fact, it was based on something that really happened. Today we'll hear all about it when we read the Bible.

Open your Bible to Hebrews 11:6, and show it to kids. Say: **Our Key Verse today** reminds us that faith is important. When we read the Bible, we can have faith that it's true, and we can trust that God is with us. Listen while I read our Key **Verse:** "And without faith it is impossible to please God." Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: "And without faith it is impossible to please God" (Hebrews 11:6).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain whether it's easy or hard to believe things you hear about faraway places or faraway times. How do you know you can believe the Bible? Why do you think faith is so important?



Say: Even though we don't usually see for ourselves the things we hear about on the news, we believe that those stories are true. And we believe what the Bible says is true even though we weren't alive when those things happened. In the same way, we can believe in God even though we don't see him. ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES. Today we'll hear about a big thing God did in one woman's life.

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BIBLE EXPLORATION

Rahab Hides the Spies

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Joshua 2, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll learn about a woman named Rahab. We'll hear how she had faith, and we'll learn that ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES.

Before we listen to what happened, let's get into character. Pretend to sneak around the room with me. Lead the children in pretending to sneak around the room for a minute, and then have the children sit in a circle.

Show the "Joshua Sends Spies to Jericho" poster.

Say: God promised to give the Israelites a lot of land, including a city called Jericho. Joshua, the leader of the Israelites, asked two of his men to sneak over into the land God had promised them. This was very dangerous, but the two men agreed. So they sneaked into the city of Jericho and stayed with a woman there named Rahab.

Let's read in the Bible to find out what happened next. Have children open their Bibles to Joshua 2. Read aloud Joshua 2:2-3.

Say: Let's play a game to find out what Rahab and the two spies did.

Put kids in groups of three. Ask one group to be the King's Men, and explain that they'll try to find the other groups. Ask one child in each other group of three to be Rahab and the other children in each group to be the Spies.

Say: In each group, Rahab will help the Spies hide from the King's Men. Rahab must find a place for the Spies to hide, but she must not hide with the Spies. Ask the King's Men to cover their eyes while the Spies hide.

After a few moments, explain that the King's Men must go to each of the Rahabs and ask if the Spies are with them. The Rahabs must try to divert the King's Men away from the Spies.

After the King's Men have looked for no more than 30 seconds, have another group become the King's Men while the original group of King's Men becomes Rahab and the Spies.

After several groups have played the King's Men, call time. Have the children sit down, and read aloud Joshua 2:4-7 as kids follow along in their Bibles. Then have the kids discuss what might've been scary about what Rahab did for the men.

Read aloud Joshua 2:8-11 as kids follow along in their Bibles.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

Why do you think faith helped the two spies and Rahab do what they did, even though it was scary? Tell about a time you had faith in a scary situation. How can faith that God can do big things help you this week?

Say: When we believe in God, we know that God is powerful and that what God promises will actually happen. Rahab had only heard about God and how he helped the Israelites, but she believed in God and his promises. When we have faith, we know God will take care of us. Our Bible Point tells us that ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES.

Signs of Faith

What You'll Do

Say: Rahab believed in God, and she believed that God was going to give the city of Jericho to the Israelites. Because Rahab had faith, she helped the spies and asked the spies to help her. She asked them to protect her and her family when the Israelites took the city. The spies told Rahab that if a red cord was hanging in her window, everyone inside her house would be protected. Then Rahab sent the spies to a place outside the city where they'd be safe from the king's men.

Cut apart the rectangles on the solid lines on the "Heart" punchouts. Then punch out the hearts, and save the rectangles you've cut apart. Cut the cellophane into squares the same size as the rectangles.



Say: Today let's make red cords as a reminder that ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES. Give each child a 24-inch length of red yarn, and set out the other supplies.

Explain that kids will make red sun catchers to hang in their windows at home. Give a square of cellophane to each child, and show kids how to glue the cellophane to the rectangle.

Circulate to assist as children work. When the children finish, carefully punch a hole in the top of each child's shape. Show kids how to thread the yarn through the hole and then tie the ends of the yarn together to form a hanger.

Gather kids by a window. Have kids hold up their sun catchers to the light as you lead kids in repeating the Key Verse with you: **"And without faith it is impossible to please God" (Hebrews 11:6).**

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about how Rahab was rewarded for her faith? Tell about a time you were rewarded for your faith. How can your experiences help you in the future?

Say: In return for Rahab's faith and help, the spies agreed to protect Rahab and her family. The red cord in the window would be a sign to the Israelites of where Rahab and her family were. God wants us to have faith, too. And as surely as the sun will rise, ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES.

Say: Today we heard how the leader of the Israelites wanted spies to look at the land. The spies wanted help from someone living in Jericho. Today when our leaders want help, they make "help wanted" posters. The poster might say, "I want you!" and then describe the help the leaders need.

God wants our help, too. He wants people who have faith to help tell others about him. Let's make "help wanted" posters to show that God wants us to have faith.

Give each child a Lesson 11 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "God Wants You!" section. Distribute crayons, and have kids write their own names in the poster's subtitle.

The Israelites Cross the Jordan River

Joshua 3:1-4:24

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Guides a Nation at the Jordan River

Parts of this event may seem like a rerun of the Israelites' crossing of the Red Sea 40 years earlier. Remember, however, that apart from Joshua and Caleb, all of the people crossing the Jordan River were no older than children when Israel crossed the Red Sea. This totally new experience must have reminded them of the stories their parents had told them about the miracle of crossing the Red Sea.

Notice that the Jordan River was not just a trickling stream—it was at "flood stage." In the area of Jericho, it would have been 10 to 12 feet deep and the current quite strong.

Israel Memorializes God's Miracle

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The Israelites built a stone memorial with the rocks taken from the center of the Jordan River. The memorial would remind people of the wonders God had done for the Israelites as they entered the Promised Land, and the 12 stones together would remind them of the 12 tribes joined together as one nation.

The last verse of today's passage, Joshua 4:24, tells us why God dried up the Jordan for the people to cross: "so that all the peoples of the earth might know that the hand of the Lord is powerful and so that you might always fear the Lord your God." God wanted his people to fear him—to give him the worship and service he deserved. Remembering what God had done would give them encouragement and faith when they faced the difficulties of conquering this new land.

The Jesus Connection

As we grow in relationship with Christ, we become more Christ-like. We can testify that we have been renewed and delivered from our different lives of the past.

Reread Joshua 4:24. Note the public display of power that God left as a reminder of his love and power. In times of darkness, it's often helpful to rest in the truth of what we have experienced in the past. Encounters with our Savior remind us that he is with us. Write a prayer of thanks for the ways God has been present in your life. When you talk to God this week, start by thanking him for these great things, and add to the list as God continues to work in your life. You can write your prayer in the lines below.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Put kids in four groups, and say: Let's play a cheering game. First I'll name a person. Then you'll have three minutes in your group to think of something special about that person—something that person would be remembered for—and to create a cheer with that special thing. You may want to help kids. For example, for "George Washington" a group could cheer, "Two! Four! Six! Eight! Washington we appreciate! Why? 'Cause he was the first president. Thanks, Washington!"

Tell kids to start by making a cheer for their parents. Allow time, and then continue the same process for one other person and God.

Say: God deserves our cheers more than anyone else. And the Bible tells us a good reason for that. Open your Bible to 1 Chronicles 16:8, and show it to kids. Then read aloud the Key Verse: "Give thanks to the Lord, call on his name; make known among the nations what he has done." Have the children repeat the verse with you several times: "Give thanks to the Lord, call on his name; make known among the nations what he has done." (1 Chronicles 16:8).

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What are some things you can thank God for? Why would you want to remember what he's done for you? How can you cheer for God this week?

Say: When we cheer for God, it's a way for us to show that we ► REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE. He deserves our cheers and praise more than anyone. God does so many wonderful things for us. Today we'll hear about a wonderful thing God did for the Israelites, and we'll hear how the Israelites thanked and remembered him.





Crossing the Jordan

What You'll Do

Open your Bible to Joshua 3, and show kids the passage. Say: In the Bible today, we'll hear how the Israelites were traveling in the desert and God did a great thing for them. We'll learn that it's important for us to ▶ REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE for others and for us.

Let kids help you crumple brown, gray, or black construction paper to make paper "rocks." You'll need at least 12 rocks, plus one for each additional child you have above 12.

Have children gather around you at one end of the room.

Say: Remember, the Israelites were still traveling in the desert. When we travel, we have to take lots of things with us. Name some things you take with you when you go on a trip. Pause as kids call out their answers.

Say: The Israelites had to carry all their things with them as they traveled. They had some very important things to carry, too—like the ark of the covenant. The ark wasn't like Noah's ark. It was more like a trunk, and inside the ark the people carried the tablets on which God had written the Ten Commandments.

Place a Bible on a chair, and explain that the Bible will represent the tablets and the chair will represent the ark. Place the 12 (or more) paper rocks in the middle of the masking-tape river you prepared ahead of time.

Say: One day as the Israelites were traveling, they came to a river called the Jordan River. This masking tape will be our Jordan River. The Jordan River was a very big river, and it was very full of water. In fact, the Bible tells us that the Jordan River was at flood stage when the Israelites went to cross it. The water would be way, way over your head. Ask the kids to reach their hands above their heads and imagine a river flowing far above their hands. Then have kids gather near the tape lines.

Play "Rushing Water" (track 18 on the CD). Tell the children that they, the Israelites, need to get to the other side of the room but the big Jordan River is right in the middle of the room, stretching the whole way across. Ask the children to discuss how they think they should get to the other side of the room.

Say: Thanks for those ideas. God had a very good way for the Israelites to cross the river. Here's what happened. God told Joshua, the leader of the Israelites, to have the priests carry the ark to the edge of the river.



Crossing the Jordan Supplies

Crossing the Jordan Easy Prep

Place 2 lines of masking tape about 4 feet apart in the middle of the room to represent the Jordan River.

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Invite two children to carry the "ark" to the edge of the "river." Then have them pretend to dip their feet in the water. When they do, turn off the CD.

Say: When the priests who were carrying the ark touched the water, the river stopped flowing. Then all the Israelites were able to cross the river on dry land! Have the children carrying the ark go to the middle of the river and stand while all the other children cross to the other side of the room.

Say: Then God told Joshua to have one person from each family take a large rock out of the river. Have kids each pick up a rock from the river. Then have the children carrying the ark join the rest of the kids.

When all the children are out of the river, play "Rushing Water" (track 18 on the CD) again. Say: When the priests came out of the river, the water started flowing again! The Jordan River was just as big and wide as it had been before.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about how God made the huge river stop so the Israelites could cross?

Tell about a time God did something great in your life or someone else's. Why do you want to remember that and what God did for the Israelites?

Say: We **REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE for us and for people we read** about in the Bible. When we learn what God has done, it reminds us that God can and does do wonderful things for us, too. The Israelites knew it was important to remember what God did for them. Let's find out what they did with those rocks they carried out of the Jordan River.

In Remembrance

What You'll Do

Ensure each child has a paper rock. Say: The Israelites used these rocks to help them remember what God did for them when he made the Jordan River stop. Let's review our Key Verse: "Give thanks to the Lord, call on his name; make known among the nations what he has done" (1 Chronicles 16:8). Have kids repeat the verse with you.

Say: In Bible times, people piled rocks together to mark very special places. Then when other people saw the pile of rocks, they'd know something amazing had happened there. Listen to what the Bible says. Read aloud Joshua 4:8-9.

Say: Let's pile our rocks together just as the Israelites did. Have kids pile the rocks. Then say: Let's tell God we remember as we sing our Key Verse song.

What ways do you show God you remember things he's done for you?

God Gives Victory Over Jericho

Joshua 6:1-27

F irst- and second-graders are well aware of how small they are and how many things they need help doing. Because it's an abstract concept, they may not initially know what it means to go to God for things. But when the concept is connected to concrete examples, they'll be able to make the connection. Use this lesson to help children see that God is powerful enough to always care for them and never let them down, no matter the circumstances.

God Gives Victory Over Jericho

Joshua 6:1-27

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Promises Victory at Jericho

Archaeologists have found the site of ancient Jericho but are still uncertain which city is the one delivered into the hands of the Israelites because it has been destroyed so many times. In light of the curse put upon Jericho in Joshua 6:26, the archaeological findings are interesting indeed.

Joshua Receives a Message From God

While scouting out the city, Joshua was no doubt surprised to see a man with a drawn sword in front of him (Joshua 5:13). We don't know if this was an appearance of God himself, a preincarnate appearance of Jesus, or an angel; however, we do know that he was someone sent from God. Notice how the messenger responds to Joshua's question: "Are you for us or for our enemies?" The messenger was the commander of the Lord's army. It was up to Joshua and Israel to be on the Lord's side, not for the commander to be on Joshua's side!

In the middle of God's message to Joshua, the writer stops to mention a very important fact in Joshua 6:1: The people of Jericho had closed up their city, counting on its strong fortifications to protect them. It was so firmly sealed that no one could go in or out. This meant that no one from Jericho would get in the way as the Israelites marched around the city walls!

God Fulfills the Promise

Notice that God not only told Joshua what to do but also told him precisely what would happen (Joshua 6:5). Assuming that the word from God spread among the Israelites, imagine their increasing anticipation as the army marched silently around the city day after day and then seven times on the seventh day. The people knew that God was about to do something spectacular! Just as promised, Rahab and her family were spared because of the faith she had shown in hiding the Hebrew spies. God's power worked to save her and the Israelites, while at the same time it was working to destroy the inhabitants of Jericho for their idolatry and immorality.

The Jesus Connection

A relationship with Jesus allows us to walk in confidence, as his power of forgiveness has given us freedom. His love for us provides us with what we need to be clean in his perfect eyes.

Take a few minutes to write down as many words of prayer as you can that show the character of God. Each day, meditate on one of these characteristics and how God has shown those characteristics in your life. Give God praise, and acknowledge God's mighty work in your life.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Gather everyone together.

Put children in two teams for a game of Tag. Explain that one team will represent people's power and the other team will represent God's power. Ask one child to be "It," and then designate an area of the room to be the "safe zone."

Have members of the People's Power team scatter around the room. Explain that the members of the People's Power team can only walk heel-to-toe, while members of the God's Power team can take giant steps.

Say: If a member of the God's Power team links elbows with a member of the People's Power team, both players can take giant steps.

Tell children that the goal is for members of the God's Power team to escort as many members of the People's Power team as possible to the safe zone before "It" tags them. "It" can tag only members of the People's Power team. If "It" tags someone who isn't linked with someone from the God's Power team, that person becomes another "It."

When children understand the rules, have them play Power Tag. After a few minutes, have kids switch roles.

Say: In our game, people had a little bit of power, but God's power was much, much greater. Like that, people need God's power to help them. Our Key Verse today tells us about people's power and God's power.

Open your Bible to 1 Peter 5:7, and show the passage to kids. Say: Listen while I read our Key Verse: "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." That means God wants us to listen to him and trust him to take care of us. Lead kids in the adapted verse: God's mighty hand cares for you (1 Peter 5:7). Have kids repeat the adapted Key Verse with you several times.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

How did God's power make a difference in this game? What was it like to be without God's power in this game?

How would you compare people's power with God's power? How does God's power work in our lives?

Say: There are lots of things in life we're just not powerful enough to do by ourselves. Today we'll read in the Bible about a group of people who just weren't powerful enough to do something on their own. They relied on God's power, though. We'll learn that ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD in our lives. Let's find out what happened.



EXPLORATION

Trumpets vs. a Wall

What You'll Do

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Open your Bible to Joshua 6, and show kids the passage. Say: God is so powerful. Today we'll hear how he did something especially powerful to help the Israelites. We'll also learn how ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD in our lives.

Have children sit in a circle. Then show "God Gives Victory Over Jericho" on the Bible Timeline.

Say: God told the Israelites to take over the city of Jericho. Jericho was a city that was built on a hill—a hill that looked like this.

Remove the "City of Jericho" poster strip depicting the hill (section number 2), and show it to the kids. Then let kids help you tape the ends of the strip together to form a circular hill. Let the kids pass around the hill to look at it, and then set it in the center of your circle.

Say: The city of Jericho sat on top of this hill. At the top of the hill, the people of Jericho had built tall, thick walls around the city. The walls were so thick that people's houses were built right inside the walls! Let's see how that might have looked.

Show kids the top picture strip of the "City of Jericho" poster (section number 1). Let kids get a close look at the picture as you point out how thick the walls were and how people's houses were built right into the walls. Show kids the scarlet cord hanging from Rahab's window, and say: **One woman named Rahab helped the Israelite spies. This is her window.**

Cut the poster into 3 horizontal strips as indicated by the cut lines. (Wait until directed in the activity to cut on the vertical cut lines of the top section.) Number the backs of the strips 1, 2, and 3, with number 1 on the top of the poster, number 2 in the middle, and number 3 at the bottom of the scene.





Invite kids to tape the city strip to the top of the middle strip showing the circular hill. Place the circular hill and city back in the center of the circle.

Say: **Before we find out what happened next, let's remember our Key Verse.** Have kids repeat the adapted Key Verse with you: **God's mighty hand cares for you (1 Peter 5:7).** Then invite kids to talk about what things the Israelites could do with God's power.

Say: God told Joshua that the Israelites wouldn't need any weapons or tools to knock down Jericho's walls. God told Joshua that instead of weapons, the Israelites would use something else to win against Jericho. Here's what God told Joshua.

Read aloud Joshua 6:2-5. Then show kids the final picture strip from the poster. Let kids help tape the strip to the bottom of the hill.

Say: The Israelites knew that Jericho was a well-protected city. They must've wondered how trumpets could knock down those thick walls. Let's make our own trumpets to think about this some more.

Distribute paper to children, and show them how to roll up a piece of paper to make a megaphone or trumpet shape. Tape the edges of kids' papers so their "trumpets" will hold their shape. Then let kids practice making noises with their trumpets.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

What do you think about the way God told the Israelites to take over Jericho?

Tell about something you need God's power to help you with. How does knowing you have God's power help you?

Say: God told the Israelites that by his power they would win the city of Jericho. God wanted the Israelites to understand that they could not win the city with their own power; they needed God's power. Our Bible Point tells us that ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD in our lives.



'Round and 'Round We Go

What You'll Do

Show the "God Gives Victory Over Jericho" poster. Say: Let's see what happened to the city of Jericho.

Have all of the children hold on to their trumpets and form a circle around the circular city.

Say: The first day, the Israelite army marched around the city once. No one was to make a sound except for the priests, who were to blow their trumpets.

Allow all the children to act like "priests" so they can all pretend to blow their paper trumpets as they walk around the wall one time.

Play "Trumpeting" (track 19 on the CD). Pause the CD when kids have finished walking around the city once.

Say: The second day, the Israelite army marched around the city again. No one was to make a sound except for the priests, who were to blow their trumpets.

Have children walk around the wall one time and blow their trumpets. Play "Trumpeting" (track 19 on the CD). After the children have walked around the wall once, pause the CD. Continue, having children walk around the wall one time for each of the third, fourth, fifth, and sixth days.



Say: On the seventh day, the Israelite army had different instructions. God told them to walk around the city seven times while the priests blew their trumpets. After seven times around, the priests would give a good long blast on their trumpets. When this happened, the Israelites were supposed to shout really loudly.

Play "Trumpeting" (track 19 on the CD). Have the children walk around the wall seven times and blow their trumpets. When they've walked around the wall seven times, have

them give a loud shout. At that point, cut on the four vertical cut lines on the top section, and bend down the walls of Jericho. Turn off the CD player.

Say: When the army shouted, the high, thick walls of Jericho fell down! The Israelite army was able to go right into the city.

Talk With Kids

Lead children in this discussion.

Ask:

How does what happened with the walls of Jericho help you believe in God's power? What can you tell others about God's power this week?

Say: The Israelite army may have had a lot of very strong, powerful people in it. But no matter how powerful those people were, they still needed God's power. God reminded the Israelites that his power was greater than theirs. They didn't need to be anxious; they just needed to trust in God's power over their own. You and I don't need to be anxious either. We just need to trust in God's power over our own. Our Bible Point tells us that ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD.

What You'll Do

Say: God's power is so great that he knocked down the walls of Jericho. Let's make something to remind us to rely on God's power this week.

Give each child a Lesson 13 My Bible Fun page, and point out the "Charged With God's Power" section on the page.

Distribute scissors, and show children how to cut out the "battery" and then the "charge level indicator." Say: When a battery's power is getting low, the charge level will drop to the bottom. But when the battery has full power, the charge level will show that.

Help kids cut a slit where indicated near the bottom of the battery. Show kids how they can slide the indicators into the slit from the back of the batteries and move them down to show low power and up to show full power.
