Exodus 13:17-14:31

P reteens feel a strong need to appear mature in front of their peers. Be sensitive as you explore the subject of fear. The expression of their fears could make them feel vulnerable, which could be a great thing if handled with care. The things preteens typically fear are beginning to be more serious. They may fear rejection, loneliness, the failure of their parents' marriage, or other things. Use this lesson to help them see God's mighty power standing with them in times of fear.

The Israelites Cross the Red Sea

Exodus 13:17-14:31

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Cares for His People

As the mass of more than 2 million Hebrews left Egypt, God knew that facing the warlike Philistines immediately would likely have made the Hebrews lose hope and turn back to Egypt. The pillar of cloud by day and pillar of fire by night must have been awesome and comforting.

God's Unusual Strategy

God instructed the Israelites to turn back somewhat toward Egypt and camp at a spot between Migdol and the Red Sea. God had a bigger plan than anyone else could know. Pharaoh would've been confident that he could easily defeat the Israelites.

The Israelites were slaves of the Egyptians only days prior to this event. They'd been beaten by the whips of the slave drivers and were familiar with the weapons the Egyptians carried. They must've realized that their fighting talents were nothing compared with the Egyptians'. And they were backed against the sea, with mountains on two sides and the Egyptians bearing down on them. The situation must've seemed hopeless.

God Shows His Power

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We can realize that God had all this planned. He knew that the people would be frightened. He knew that they would doubt him. But he also knew that his power would be remembered forever. God knew that he would prevail, that the Hebrews would be saved from Pharaoh, and that the result would be a people growing greatly in their faith in him.

It may seem odd that no record of this event has been found in Egyptian history. However, it's likely that all records were wiped from the books because it would've been an embarrassment for the world to know that mighty Egypt had been devastated by its own lowly slaves.

The Jesus Connection

We live in troubled times, when it's easy for people to lose heart and feel hopeless and lost. But a relationship with Jesus can give us peace and joy. Jesus is our light in dark times.

When have you felt out of sorts and desperate to find some control over your situation? Perhaps the Israelites felt these things after they escaped from Egypt. Although they may not have recognized it at the time, eventually they were able to look back and see how God used that time to protect them and bring glory to himself.

What part of your life might God have his hand in now? What can you do to connect with God during times of fear and desperation? Take a few minutes to reflect on God's hand in your life. Write your reflection here.

My Sea of Fears

What You'll Do

As kids arrive, play "Ocean Thunderstorm" (track 2 on the CD). Replay the segment as needed (or set your CD player to repeat the track). Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

When everyone has arrived, distribute this week's Bible Buzz pages, one piece of blue construction paper, and a marker to each preteen.

Say: Find a partner, and tell about a time you or someone you know was scared because of a lot of water. Allow time.

Say: Being in water that's too deep is just one situation in which you might be afraid. On your piece of blue paper, create a list of things you fear or used to fear when you were younger. By yourself, write as many as you can think of in two minutes. You won't have to share every item you write down with the whole group.

When two minutes are up, have kids form pairs and share two of their fears with their partner. Then direct kids to the "My Sea of Fears" section on the Bible Buzz pages. Ask each pair to share two of their fears with the whole group. As kids share, have everyone write the fears they hear on their Bible Buzz page next to the numbers under the "My Sea of Fears" heading. When all groups have shared, say: I know it might've been difficult to identify and share your fears. Thank you to each one of you for being bold and trusting each other enough to share your ideas.

Have kids set aside the blue papers that have their original list of fears written on them. You'll use these later in the "My Sea of Calm" activity.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to think about your fears? What did you notice as everyone shared their fears? How do you usually deal with your fears? Explain.

Say: We have a chance today to find out how a group of people faced their fears. They were the Israelites, and Moses was their leader. The fears you wrote are just as important as the Israelites' fears were. Let's learn from their experience, and, most important, let's learn how SOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.





Pharaoh the Menace

What You'll Do

Show kids the "Israelites Cross the Red Sea" picture on the Bible Timeline.

Say: After more than 400 years of slavery in Egypt, God used Moses to lead the Israelites out of Egypt. After many signs, miracles, and plagues, the Egyptian Pharaoh told the Israelites they could leave. The frightened Israelites left Egypt on their journey to the Promised Land. Let's illustrate their journey.

Have kids form seven groups, and make sure each group has a Bible, paper, and markers. (A group can be one child.) If you have fewer than seven kids, you could assign two scenes to each child. Give one of these scenes to each group:

- Scene 1-Exodus 13:17-22
- Scene 2—Exodus 14:1-4
- Scene 3—Exodus 14:5-9
- Scene 4-Exodus 14:10-14
- Scene 5—Exodus 14:15-20
- Scene 6—Exodus 14:21-22
- Scene 7-Exodus 14:23-30

Say: Welcome to the Giant Bible Comix Company. Each of you has been hired to illustrate an exciting Bible narrative for our giant comics! On your papers, draw the scene from your assigned Bible passage. After about 15 minutes, we'll tape the scenes together on a wall and create the greatest giant Bible comics! Allow time.

Have kids read their passages and create their scenes. As they're drawing, walk around and encourage them, answer any questions, and offer ideas. Monitor progress, and distribute more paper as needed. When time is up, have kids form groups of seven with one person from each of the previous groups. Have each new group tape its scenes together on the wall. If you have an uneven number of kids in any group, have those kids tape their drawings beneath or above others that are similar in their comic series. Allow kids to explain their drawings as they go through the comic.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What's your reaction to the people and actions you drew in your scene? What did you observe about their actions? Exodus 14:14 says, "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." What does it mean in your life for God to fight for you? How can God help you when you're afraid?

Say: Your comics fit this passage so well. God is the superhero in this passage. The Israelites experienced real fear as Pharaoh's army chased them. We may not have an angry army chasing us, but the fears we have are just as real. Let's explore some ways we can trust that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

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3 WEAVING FAITH

Fearless

What You'll Do

Say: I'm looking for some kids who are willing to do something that might be a little scary in return for an unknown reward. When you have at least one child (or as many as there are blindfolds) who wants to go on an adventure, have the other kids help put blindfolds on the willing kids. Have the unblindfolded kids hold their hands in the air and repeat after you: I, [child's name], will forfeit the reward I could've had if I'd worn a blindfold.

Have the unblindfolded kids help make sure the blindfolded kids can't see and help them line up on the far end of the room from you. Play "Roller Coaster Noises" (track 3 on the CD) on repeat throughout this activity. Ask the unblindfolded kids to come see you. Whisper to them very quietly: We're going to make the other kids believe there are some pretty fantastic obstacles in this room. Once we've pretended to set up the obstacles, you'll follow the same instructions as the blindfolded kids, and it's your job to make them believe there's danger ahead. Let's set up!

With any kids that aren't wearing blindfolds, move heavy things around, making lots of noise. Don't create any actual roadblocks, but make it sound as if you're doing that. Say: **Well**, **that's a drop-off we'll have to be careful about. I sure hope nobody falls into that!** If any of the blindfolded kids are worried, remind them that they can take off their blindfolds any time if they're too worried to continue, but if they keep them on, they'll get a reward at the end. Also make it clear that the kids who aren't participating won't be getting treats.

Begin by giving the blindfolded kids directions for how to cross the room. Say: **Take three medium-sized steps toward my voice.** Wait for kids to follow through. **Good. Now you're going to want to squat down and walk to the right five steps. Duck low—you don't want to hit the power cord.** Wait for kids to follow through, making comments if any kids take too few steps and reminding them to duck very low. **Okay, you're safe from that. You can stand up, but now you're coming to the area of the room where there's a pretty big drop-off. Sorry, we didn't mean to make this so dangerous, but you're going to have to jump really carefully so you don't fall.** Wait for kids to follow through. **There's a table right in front of you. Turn to the left and take four steps to avoid hitting the table.** Wait for kids to follow through. **Now lie down and crawl on the floor to avoid the swinging rock that's up ahead.** Wait for kids to follow through. Encourage them to crawl as low as possible on their bellies. Narrate the rock coming and going, saying things such as "Here it comes—keep yourselves really low!" Allow kids to stand up, and say: Keep your blindfolds

on. You've done well, and you've reached the end of your challenge. Now for your final challenge, I'm going to put something in your hand. It might be a spider, it might be a snake, or it might be something else. This is the last thing you have to do to get your treat. I can promise that this thing will not harm you. Do you trust me enough to hold out your hand?

As kids hold out their hands, place the wrapped candies in their palms. When candies have been distributed to those who participated, allow kids to take off their blindfolds and enjoy their treats. Then distribute candies to the kids who participated but didn't hold out their hands. Sit together on the floor.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was this activity like for you? In what ways was this activity like or unlike how God helps us when we're afraid? Tell about one way you can trust that God is helping you the next time you're afraid.

Say: You followed directions that made no sense for where we are. Even if you could see, the directions still didn't make sense. Just like God was in control even though things looked really scary to the Israelites when they were trapped against the sea, we can trust that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

My Sea of Calm

What You'll Do

Play "Calm Sea Sounds" (track 4 on the CD) during this activity. Replay the segment as needed. Have kids find their blue papers with their fears written on them.

Say: Just as Moses and the Israelites stood in front of their fear, trapped between the Red Sea and Pharaoh's army, we now stand in front of our fears. Let's call upon God to help us with the fears we hold in our hands. After we have silently prayed together, let's imagine God parting our "Sea of Fears" by tearing these pieces of paper in half.

Have kids pray silently and then tear their papers in half. Allow about a minute of silent reflection. Then have everyone tear his or her piece of blue paper into more pieces and throw the pieces in the air to symbolize the freedom God gives us over these fears.

Have kids pick up and hold the torn pieces of paper as they look at the verses listed on the "My Sea of Calm" activity on their Bible Buzz pages. Say: **One place we can go to** find reminders that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID is the Bible. Find a verse that helps you in your sea of fears, and read it to yourself a few times. Allow a minute.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to tear up your fears and let go of them? What's the difference between facing something scary by yourself and facing that same thing with God beside you? In what ways do you think God wants you to let go of your fears because he's with you?

Say: Fear is a very real thing. Being afraid isn't wrong, but it's best for us when we can let go of our fears and leave them in God's good hands. Just as the Israelites were forced to depend on God and it was scary for them, sometimes the scariest things we go through help us see that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

Have kids help you pick up the paper pieces and set them aside for the closing prayer.

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Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think this week about how we can trust that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

In the morning, spend one minute leaning against a wall. Let the wall remind you of how God is with you and supports you when you're afraid. Write an account of the times God has helped you when you were afraid. Talk to your mom and dad, and ask them to add their accounts to the end of your story. Read the story whenever you feel afraid. Read Exodus 14:14. Draw a map of what a battle scene might look like. Then change it by adding the difference that might be made if God was fighting the battle for you. Pray over your life, asking God to fight for you and help you learn to be still.

Make sure you choose a Daily Challenge as well, and tell the kids what you chose. Kids will be more inclined to follow through on their commitments when they see you doing the same.

Say: The Israelites faced an impossible and scary situation, but God was with them. Let's remember that ► GOD HELPS US WHEN WE'RE AFRAID by following through with our Daily Challenges this week.

Send the letter to parents home with your kids or give it to parents when they pick up their children. This is a great way to show families they're important to your church and to support their role as spiritual leaders to their children.

Encourage kids to talk with their parents about the Daily Challenges they chose and what they learned about trusting God when they're afraid. Kids can also do the activities in the "HomeConnect" section of their Bible Buzz pages with their families.

God Sends Quail and Manna

Exodus 16:1-26

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The People Become Hungry in the Wilderness

Approximately 30 days had passed since the Hebrew people left Egypt. Apparently the food they had brought with them had run out, and they began complaining. How quickly they had forgotten the oppression of the Egyptians! The people were just starting to get to know God, and they had very little framework to realize God would provide for them. This event marks a learning point for the Israelites.

God's Glory Shown to the People

We don't know exactly what "the glory of the Lord" was that the Israelites saw in the morning, but it was a visible sign to them (perhaps like the cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night mentioned in Exodus 13). God wanted Israel to know that he was still there, that he was aware of their need, and that he was going to provide for them.

God Provides for the People

When the manna appeared the first morning, the Hebrews' question "What is it?" apparently caught on as its name because manna means "What is it?" Though some have suggested various possibilities for what manna was, nothing we know of today is a good match for the description given in Exodus 16:31: "It was white like coriander seed and tasted like wafers made with honey."

The miraculous nature of manna is further exhibited in what happened to it over the course of a Sabbath as opposed to a weekday. The Israelites were not to work on the Sabbath but to keep it as a day for worship. Gathering manna on the Sabbath would have been work, so God simply didn't make it appear. If anyone tried to keep manna from one weekday to the next, it would spoil. However, if anyone kept it from the morning before the Sabbath, it would stay good through the Sabbath.

The Jesus Connection

God is our Provider. Everything we have is from God, and he has provided a way for us to have a relationship with him through Jesus.

What do you find yourself wanting more than anything? How often do you view this desire as a need? It's important to recognize the difference. God allowed the Hebrews to live as slaves for many years. When God decided they needed to leave Egypt, he provided the miraculous opportunity to do so.

Our greatest need is to honor and glorify God. Regardless of our wants, we're fulfilled when living in God's will. Write a prayer here to glorify God for giving you what you need.

Stranded

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

After kids arrive, have them form groups of four. Distribute this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids find the "Surviving the Jungle" section.

Say: Today we'll consider what things you'd need for survival if you were stranded in the middle of nowhere with few supplies. Let's listen to a story that explains how you got yourselves into this unfortunate predicament. As you listen, try to think of solutions to the situations these people face. When the story's over, you're going to write a new ending for it, so try to think of that as you listen. Play "Two Guys, Two Girls, and an Airplane" (track 5 on the CD).

Say: Now let's write our own endings. There are some questions on your Bible Buzz pages to help you think through some of your responses. Distribute pens, and allow kids time to answer the questions.

Give groups a few minutes to write their own endings to the story. When they've finished, have groups share their endings with the entire group.

Say: Great job creating these endings. Now you get to imagine that you have the opportunity to interact with the people in this story throughout the entire scenario, not just for the ending. Think about the advice you'd give our four adventurers to help them escape this situation.

Have groups record their responses in their Bible Buzz pages where it asks kids to give advice to Walt, Rene, Bob, and Cindy.

Talk With Kids

When they've finished, have groups of four share their answers to these questions.

Ask:

What three needs are most important to you in your life?

Say: We all need things to survive. Some of the things we think are important to us might radically change if we faced something like in our survival activity. God Provides Water

Exodus 17:1-7

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Food and Whine

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As we begin today's lesson, we find the Israelites continuing their journey toward the Promised Land. They're still getting manna every morning and quail every evening, but they can't find water at their latest campsite. It's important to take a moment to recall that the Israelites were just beginning to know God. This is the first time God had interacted with the Israelite community as a whole. Though this doesn't excuse their actions, it might give some context for us to see ourselves in more clearly.

Again, instead of calling in faith upon the God who had secured their freedom, turned bitter water sweet, and provided manna and quail, the people complained to Moses. Again, instead of trusting God, they lamented that they were going to die in the desert for lack of water. As you can see from Exodus 17:4, Moses was exasperated. God, however, proves his patience and love in this passage, giving the Hebrews the water they needed in spite of their complaining and their lack of faith.

Acting on Faith

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God had a plan. His instructions to Moses must have seemed ludicrous! Moses was to take with him the leaders of the people—likely representatives from each tribe—so that they could see firsthand what God was going to do. In front of these leaders, Moses was to hit with his staff a rock that God would point out to him. And enough water would come out of the rock to take care of the needs of 2 million people. As unlikely as God's plan seemed, Moses didn't question God. He did what God told him to do, and God did what he said he would do. Moses and God gave a convincing demonstration of what acting on faith in God can do. And God was glorified when the leaders brought back their report.

Be Encouraged

The names Moses gave to the place where all this happened mean "temptation" and "murmuring." No doubt Moses' intent was to make this place a reminder of the people's unbelief but also an encouragement toward faith in the God who had provided for them.

The Jesus Connection

Think of someone who has frustrated you recently. What needs to happen to resolve the situation? A relationship with Jesus brings us forgiveness, not perfection. Pray for clarity and the opportunity to recognize when you need to extend the same type of grace and understanding that Jesus has given you. On the lines below, write a prayer for the person who has recently frustrated you.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Say: There's nothing more fun than everyone in the family piling into the car for a carefree two-week drive across the country—unless there's a whiner in the car.

Distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids find the "Bugs Me!" section.

Say: Take 60 seconds to write down three things that absolutely bug you when you're on a long car trip. Maybe it bugs you that your car doesn't have air conditioning, or maybe wearing a seat belt for hours drives you crazy. Write down three things quickly. Go!

When 60 seconds have passed, take a poll to see which things were most common. Find a willing preteen to offer up an idea from his or her list. Say: **If you have the same thing as** [name of preteen saying the idea], **whine "Me, too."** When this person's item has been polled, continue asking for willing kids to share their ideas as kids respond.

Say: We're going to listen in on an entire family of whiners as they head off to Grandma's for a vacation. They've been in the car exactly 10 minutes when we hear them say this:

Play "The Whiners" (track 7 on the CD).

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Tell about a time you were on a trip with someone who was a whiner. What about a time *you* were the whiner? How do people react to you when you're whining and complaining?

Say: If we're honest, we all have to admit that sometimes we can be whiners and complainers. Today we'll explore a whole nation of complainers. And we'll discover what it means that ▶ GOD IS PATIENT WITH US. Let's remember to be grateful for God's patience and try not to misuse it with complaining.

How Thirsty Are You?

What You'll Do

Say: To help us think about our Bible passage today, let's experience what it's like to be thirsty. Give each preteen a couple of salty crackers. Have kids eat the crackers. Don't allow anyone to get anything to drink.

Have kids form groups of about four and come up with some ideas of ways to obtain water. Say: I bet you're pretty thirsty after those crackers, so take some time to think up ways to get water. You might design a covert operation, an argument for why you need water, or a scientific experiment that might produce water. It's your choice. Allow time.

When kids have come up with their ideas, have them present them to the entire group.

Say: You're going to act out the parts described on a track we'll listen to on the CD. There are no lines or actions to learn—kids have to make up their parts as they go.

Ask for willing kids for these roles: Bernie, Moses, Man, Woman, and Elders. The rest of the kids can be the Israelites. Give Moses the sole prop you'll need: a pencil to serve as his staff. If you have a large group, you might break kids into groups of 8 to 10 and have them follow along. This way, each person will have an active role.

Play "Complaints, Complaints" (track 8 on the CD).

Say: The Bible says the Israelites "put the Lord to the test." Their whining and complaining wasn't pretty to listen to, that's for sure. Ask kids how thirsty they are at this point, and then give them cups of water.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain what it was like to be thirsty but not be given any water to drink. How did being thirsty test your patience? What do you think it means that the Israelites "put the Lord to the test"? Tell about a time you've been concerned about whether you have the things you need.

What does God's response to the Israelites' complaining show us?

Say: The Israelites were learning about God's care for them. They were learning that he was going to take care of them. When they put him to the test, they found that he was there caring for them, even though he didn't enjoy all that complaining.

Complainers Hall of Shame Supplies

Complainers Hall of Shame

What You'll Do

Say: God has had plenty of opportunities to deal with complainers just like the Israelites and us, and we can learn something about him by seeing how he responded to the Israelites.

Ask kids to form pairs, and give each pair a Bible, paper, and two pens. Have kids find the "Grievance Cards" on their Bible Buzz pages and follow the instructions found there.

Say: A grievance is when someone does something wrong and you write a report of what happened. You'll have 10 minutes to fill out the "Grievance Cards." Allow time.

Say: We all complain from time to time. But God wants us to be content, not complaining. Let's explore a verse that helps us have an attitude like this.

Have kids find and read the Key Verse, Psalm 23:1-2, on their Bible Buzz pages: "The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters."

Distribute three index cards to each preteen. Say: Now reevaluate the Grievance Cards you wrote earlier. Look at each one with the Key Verse in mind. On your index card, write a new way to look at that situation. When kids have finished all three of their index cards, have them tape these over the Grievance Cards on their Bible Buzz pages.

Talk With Kids

Lead pairs in this discussion.

Ask:

Why would it matter to a sheep to be in green pastures? to be led beside quiet waters?

Ask pairs to report their insights to the larger group.

Say: Sheep trust the shepherds to provide the care they need. God cares for us, his sheep, and as we allow him to do this, we will complain less.

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Do you typically think of complaining as something that's wrong or as something that you are justified in doing? Why? What's one area of life in which you think you might complain more than you'd like to? How does the Key Verse help you change your thoughts about complaining? What can you do to change your attitude the next time you feel like complaining?

Say: There are probably lots of things we do that test God's patience, as the Israelites did. We can refocus our minds, as our Key Verse does, to help us avoid complaining. If we think of God as our good shepherd leading us through obstacles in life, we can talk to him and follow him without complaining. ► GOD IS PATIENT WITH US, and we can show him love by avoiding complaining.

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No-Complaint Zone

What You'll Do

Say: We usually complain because it's easier to complain than to think of an alternative. So to help you think of ways to not complain, we're going to play the "No-Complaint" game!

Provide four index cards and a pen to each preteen.

Say: On your index cards, write four complaints you regularly have, writing one complaint on each card. If kids need help, you might offer suggestions of complaints they have. Kids might complain about their sisters taking too long in the bathroom, the amount of homework they have, or an older brother taking their stuff without asking.

Give kids a few minutes to write one complaint per card. Say: **Our complaining is not** a **pleasant sound to hear. It can get overwhelming, kind of like these groan tubes.** Shake a mini groan tube for kids to hear.

Then have kids form two teams and line up at one end of the room with their cards. Give each team a mini groan tube. Say: **The first person on each team will take the mini** groan tube as she or he walks heel to toe to the other end of the room and then skips back to the relay line. The first person will read the complaint on one of his or her cards to the next person in line in the whiniest, most annoying voice possible. The second person in line will come up with a non-complaining alternative to the

complaint and then take the groan tube and repeat the process as the first person goes to the back of the line.

Run the relay several times so kids can use different complaint cards. When kids have finished the relay, congratulate everyone for finding alternatives to complaining.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Was it easy or hard to come up with non-complaining responses in this game? Why?

How is that like stopping yourself from complaining in real life? How can you let God help you not complain?

Say: Complaining is a useless thing. It wastes our time, focuses us on negative things, and distracts us from God. There's no place for complaining in our lives. The Israelites put God's patience to the test, and because of that, we can see how ▶ GOD IS PATIENT WITH US. Find alternatives to complaining like you did in our game. Try to find ways to focus on God rather than on complaints.

God Gives the Ten Commandments (Part 1) Exodus 19:16–20:21

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

This week's Bible Background concentrates on the events surrounding the giving of the Ten Commandments, while next week's concentrates on the commandments themselves. You may want to read both Bible Backgrounds before beginning this lesson.

The Israelites Battle the Amalekites

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The Amalekites attacked the Israelites where they were camped. God had prepared the Israelites' faith for this test through his provision for them in so many ways. So the Israelites put together an army under the leadership of Joshua and went on the attack. Moses held high in the air the staff that had struck the rock to get water—"the staff of God." As long as Moses held the staff in the air, the Israelites continued to win—so Aaron and Hur helped hold Moses' hands up, and the Israelites defeated the Amalekites (Exodus 17:8-16).

Jethro Advises Moses to Focus on God

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Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, came to visit after the battle with the Amalekites. Seeing Moses burdened with judging disagreements among the 2 million Israelites, Jethro gave Moses some good advice. He suggested that Moses appoint judges to serve the people so that Moses could concentrate on what was most important—being the people's representative before God. Moses took the advice and then led the Israelites on to Mount Sinai, where Moses had previously met God in the burning bush. They arrived at Mount Sinai three months to the day from when they left Egypt (Exodus 18:5–19:2).

Moses Receives the Commandments From God

A significant event is recorded in the next few verses (Exodus 19:3-9): God spoke to Moses and promised

him that Israel would be his treasured possession, his holy people—if they would obey him. After Moses told the people what God had said, they responded gratefully: "We will do everything the Lord has said." God responded by telling Moses that God himself would come down and speak with the Israelites from a cloud.

The law God gave spelled out how the Israelites were to honor him through their obedience. In the thousands of years that have passed since this event, one thing hasn't changed: The best way we can honor God is by obeying him.

The Jesus Connection

Following Jesus is not about obeying rules; it's about knowing him. However, our obedience in honoring and glorifying God in our everyday lives allows our relationship with Jesus to grow.

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Honor Laws

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

When all kids have arrived, have them form four groups. Distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids find the "Honor My Leader" section. Explain that each group is a country and can determine what the name of its country should be.

Say: Determine who in your group has the next birthday. Pause. Ta-da! You're a country now, and that person is the king or queen of your country. Your royal ruler will take a few minutes to think of four "honor laws"—four ways his or her subjects will honor their ruler. In the meantime the rest of you, ahem...subjects will think of four ways you can honor your ruler. Feel free to be silly with these rules.

Encourage kids to take a few minutes to write in the "Law" columns for their countries.

After groups have written their laws, have the rulers and their subjects compare lists and see if they can agree on four "honor laws" for their country. Allow just a couple of minutes for this, and let kids know when their time is almost over.

Talk With Kids

Have each preteen pair up with a person from another country to discuss these questions.

Ask:

How did the subjects' laws and the rulers' laws differ? Why do you think the rulers and their subjects had different rules and objectives?

Why can it be hard to follow rules that someone else makes for you?

Say: Sometimes rules don't make sense to us, and that makes us not really want to follow those rules. And even when rules do make sense, we don't always like being told what to do. Today we'll explore how God gave us commandments and what it means that we can ► HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM.





God and His People

What You'll Do

Show kids the "God Gives the Ten Commandments" picture on the Bible Timeline. Say: When God was ready to give his commandments to his people, he brought thunder, lightning, and even an earthquake. He certainly got their attention.

Have kids get back in their countries. Say: As a country, go to each of the four stations set up around the room to find out what God told the Israelites in today's Bible passage. You'll have about four minutes at each station. I'll give you a warning each time it's nearly time to change to a new station. Go!

Play "Obey My Commandments" (John 14:15) (track 9 on the CD) in the background during this activity.

Allow four minutes per rotation. When there's one minute left, give kids a gentle oneminute warning. Then let them know when it's time to move to another station.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.


Ask:

Which of these commandments would you most like to make part of your life this week? Why?

Not all rules are good. What might lead you to believe that God's rules are good?

What can you learn from the way God asked Moses and the Israelites to honor him?

Say: The way we honor God may be different from the Israelites' experience at Mount Sinai, but the basic principles are the same. We \blacktriangleright HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM. Thanks to the Ten Commandments, we know that by honoring only one God, not worshipping idols, honoring God's name, and keeping the Sabbath, we can please God. Let's see how, with those rules, we might be able to honor God today.

Life With Honor

What You'll Do

Have kids remain in their countries from the "Honor Laws" activity. Give each group a Bible, and distribute scratch paper and pens. Ask groups to reread the first four commandments (Exodus 20:2-11).

Say: On your paper, write the names of four people you know who have done something that reflects the commandments you just read. When everyone in your group has written down four names, have your group members share information about those people with one another. Using those people as examples, come up with four ideas that reflect the first four commandments. For example, you might write the name of a neighbor who keeps the Sabbath by taking her family on a "worship hike" after church. Your idea might then be "Sunday is Celebrate God's Creation Day." Write your team's ideas in the "Words of Honor" section in your Bible Buzz pages.

Once groups have come up with four new ideas, have each group share its ideas with the rest of the group.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

How can other people help you remember how to honor God? In what ways does obedience show honor to God?

Say: It's fun to think of ways to help ourselves honor God. But the most important thing to remember is we ► HONOR GOD BY OBEYING HIM. We can follow the Ten Commandments as a way to honor God.

What You'll Do

God Gives the Ten Commandments (Part 2) Exodus 19:16–20:21

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Last week's Bible Background concentrated on the events surrounding the giving of the Ten Commandments, while this week's concentrates on the commandments themselves. If you haven't already done so, you may want to read both of them before beginning this lesson.

Commandments With a Purpose

These commandments weren't given to force the Israelites to follow an arbitrary set of rules. These commands were intended to help the people live their lives to the fullest in relationship with one another.

With the death and resurrection of Jesus, we live no longer under the law but under grace. Jesus said he came to fulfill the law (Matthew 5:17-18). Certainly we are not bound to follow these laws to try to win God's favor, but the principles behind the Ten Commandments are valid principles for all time.

Commandments in Two Categories

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Over the centuries, scholars have divided the commandments into categories in varying ways. For the purpose of these studies, we're dividing them into two sections. The first four commandments have to do with our relationship with God; the last six have to do with our relationships with others.

God's Commandments Establish Priorities

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The commandments regarding our relationship with God clearly spell out the priority and honor that he is to hold in our lives. How often—even in the Christian community—do we let other things come before our relationship with God?

One commandment that is often taken too lightly, especially in today's culture, is the instruction not

to misuse God's name. To use it in swearing or frivolously in joking is not appropriate. How we use God's name directly reflects how we feel about God. He and his name are worthy of all the honor we can muster!

The commandments regarding our relationships with others (Exodus 20:12-17) give us lots of guidance on how to respect others. Though even our Christian culture can fail to take many of these commands seriously, living by them gives people the honor and respect due them as unique creations of God. No matter what we see around us, we must hold true to these principles if we are to honor God and respect others the way God intends.

The Jesus Connection

As our relationship with Jesus grows, we can begin to see this world and other people through his eyes of unconditional love. We will enjoy fellowship more and others will see Jesus' presence in our lives.

God wants us to alter our lives to reflect our Savior who loves us enough to die for us. It's easy to get distracted, even by good things, and we can get caught up trying to be like other Christians more than we try to be like Jesus himself.

God loves his creation so much that he gave us commandments to help preserve it and glorify him. God's greatest creation is humanity—and we are surrounded by it. Every person you have contact with today gives you an opportunity to glorify God by lifting up his greatest creation—people. At the end of the day, take note of who God blessed through you and how you were blessed in his service. You can write your prayer in the space below.

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A Little Respect

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Ask kids to form pairs. Distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have pairs find the "Say What?" section.

Say: With your partners, you're going to complete the "Say What?" story by filling in the blanks. Each blank has a description, and each partner will think up a word according to the description. Let's fill in the first blank together to see how this works. The first blank is a place. Now each person needs to think of a place and tell your partner, who will write the word in the first blank in the story. We'll continue until all the blanks are filled in. The blanks are numbered in the story so you can keep track. If a word needs to be repeated, it will indicate which blank it comes from. For example, the name you choose for blank 2 is also used in blank 5.

Have kids switch Bible Buzz pages and take turns asking their partners for a word to fill in each of the blanks. Don't have kids read the stories yet; make sure they just look at the blanks and ask their partners to give them an example of each kind of word to fill in.

When the first partner is finished, have partners switch roles so each person has a completed story.

Allow partners to read their silly stories aloud to each other.

Talk With Kids

Have partners discuss these questions together.

Ask:

Do you think the outcome of your story showed respect to the people whose names you used? Explain.

In what ways can you tell when you're showing respect to someone else? In what ways can you tell when you're not showing respect to someone else?

Say: Our stories were silly, but they helped us understand respect a little more. God made each person, and he wants us to treat everyone with respect. Today we'll look at the Ten Commandments God gave Moses on Mount Sinai. In the last six commandments, ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS.





Commandments of Respect

What You'll Do

Show kids the "God Gives the Ten Commandments" picture on the Bible Timeline. Then say: **If you think the Ten Commandments are restrictive, go to this side of the room.** Indicate one side of the room. **If you think they aren't restrictive, go to this side of the room.** Indicate the other side of the room. Make sure kids know it's okay for them to honestly choose either side. Encouraging honesty is better than guilting them into choosing a "right" answer.

Allow kids a few minutes to discuss with others on their side why they think the Ten Commandments are restrictive or not. Then have each side share what they came up with.

Say: It might seem like the Ten Commandments are nothing but a list of "do's and don'ts." But the Ten Commandments are about honoring God and respecting others, and it's how we do or don't do things that offers endless possibilities!

Form six groups, and have each group gather around one of the stations you set up earlier.

Say: Use these Commandment Stations to help get your creative juices flowing. Each station is based on one of the last six commandments. As a group you'll rotate through the stations. At each station, read the directions on the card for a creative example of that commandment. I'll tell you when it's time to move to the next station.

Give groups about two or three minutes at each station. When groups have rotated through all six stations, ask each group to show everyone else their favorite creative projects.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

How did this activity change the way you think about following the Ten Commandments?

Are some of the commandments harder for you to follow than others? Explain.

How did this activity change the way you think about how to respect others?

Say: The Israelites had no rules at all, so they needed the commandments, and we can be thankful for them, too. Sometimes the Ten Commandments may seem strict, but instead of seeing a list of fun-ruiners, we can see the endless ways we can respect others. We can help, protect, honor, and celebrate each other. What a privilege to have so many great ways ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS.

Do's and Don'ts

What You'll Do

For this activity, you'll need a large open area. Scatter paper all over the floor of the open area. Have kids read the Key Verse, Matthew 19:18-19, on their Bible Buzz pages: " 'Do not murder, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not give false testimony, honor your father and mother,' and 'love your neighbor as yourself.' "

Form four groups. Give each group a marker, and have group members link arms. Read the Key Verse aloud again, and tell the groups to remember the different commandments listed in the Key Verse.

Say: Let's play a game to help us remember this. The object is to get to the other side of the room before the other groups. You can't step anywhere but on the papers, and you can't step on any papers that you haven't written on. You must remain in contact with the people in your group who are crossing the room. They have to be touching one another at all times.

Tell kids you're going to read a situation and the group has to think of a commandment listed in the Key Verse that might help with that situation. The first person in each group will quickly write that commandment on a paper on the floor. Then that person will step on that paper and give a description of how he or she might apply that commandment. Then he or she will hand the marker to the next person. That person can repeat the process. Then he or she can step on that commandment, making sure to somehow remain connected to the rest of the group at all times. The group can continue to list as many commandments as they think might apply. They can create new commandment steppingstone papers for each commandment they think of that applies to the situation. When kids run out of commandments for a situation, move on to the next one. For example, in the first situation in which two young kids are fighting over a toy, kids might link that to the "Do not steal" commandment. They can think of multiple commandments for each situation if the commandments apply. Each group can travel only on paper, and no one can step on a paper that's written on unless, of course, their team wrote on it.

Keep the activity going by changing situations at random times. Use these ideas for situations:

Two young children are fighting over a toy.

A married couple has an argument, and one of them leaves.

A vase is stolen from an art museum, and there were two people who could've stolen it in the room at that time.

A child's parents want her to go to bed, but she's not tired.

Two kids in the hall are getting ready to fight.

Someone is chatting online while his parents aren't home; this online chat buddy wants to meet him.

Some friends sneak into an R-rated movie. Two sworn enemies are trapped in the same building during a hurricane.

Say: God gives us his commandments to help us know how to live our lives in the best way possible. We can follow these commands and have a full life.

Have kids sit in groups to discuss how standing on the papers was like walking through life by following God's commandments.

Provide pens, and have kids find the "My Prayers…" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Have kids write a prayer request after each commandment. Encourage kids to ask not only for strength to resist certain temptations but also for compassion for those who don't.

Talk With Kids

Lead all the kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What did your group decide was similar about walking on the papers with commands on them and the way you can navigate life by following God's commands?

What encouraged you about some of the ways you thought of to apply these commandments?

What does that say about how we might think of using the commandments? Which commandment seems to have the most varied uses? Why do you think that is?

Say: In tense situations, it's sometimes hard to think about how we respect others. We often do the easiest thing and just worry about ourselves. But if we turn to God in these stressful times, he'll guide us in our relationships. God's commandments helped the Israelites know how to respect each other, and we can be thankful that ► GOD TELLS US HOW TO RESPECT OTHERS through those same commandments.

The Israelites Worship a Golden Calf

Exodus 32:1-25

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Out of Sight

Moses was up on the mountain for a long time receiving all the laws from God—almost six weeks (Exodus 24:18)! It's likely that the Israelites feared Moses had perished on the mountain. Since he had been their main contact with God, they may have reasoned that they had lost contact with God, too.

The Hebrews spent more than 400 years seeing "gods" in Egypt, and now they'd been asked to serve and follow a God they couldn't see. For the majority of the time they'd known God, he'd had personal relationships with individuals among them. They may not have realized God was interested in each of them individually and as an entire community.

They'd been camped in the same place for six weeks and were likely getting anxious to move on. They couldn't even see God's representative, so they fell back on what they were familiar with and asked for a god they could see who would continue to lead them.

What Was Aaron Thinking?

Aaron's willingness to go along suggests that he, too, had some doubt about Moses' return. However, some believe that Aaron's request for gold earrings was an attempt to avert the people's desire for a god. If they realized they had to give up things of value, they

might decide they didn't really want a golden god after all. If that was Aaron's intent, his attempt failed.

After making the idol, Aaron's proclamation was that there'd be a "festival to the Lord." The name translated Lord (Yahweh) is the name by which God had announced himself to Moses at the burning bush. Apparently, Aaron thought that this idol could somehow represent the true God. Regardless of his motives, Aaron was wrong in making the idol. He led the people in disobeying God's second commandment (Exodus 20:4). In talking to Moses, Aaron tried to make it seem as if he had no choice and that the fire itself had mysteriously shaped the calf. God's sparing of Aaron in this situation was certainly an example of his mercy and grace.

The Jesus Connection

We are surrounded by things that promise to bring us immediate pleasure and satisfaction. Many of these promises are deceitful, leading to destruction. But even God's blessings themselves can distract us from our true calling of worshipping God. Jesus came to offer the only thing that's truly worth having. Take a moment to write a prayer revealing your heart's desire to follow God and asking for his help in dislodging some things that might be stealing your worship away from God.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went. Have kids form four groups.

Say: It's election time. Each group has been assigned to work on a campaign for one of the potential future presidents. I'm going to give you a card that describes the candidate, and you have to come up with a speech that persuades us to vote for your candidate. You can be as creative as you want.

Distribute one of the "Future President" cards to each group. Allow groups time to create their slogans for a short commercial about their candidates. When groups are ready, have them present their commercials. When commercials are over, have kids gather in the center of the room. Distribute an index card and pen to each preteen. Say: **Write the name of your favorite candidate—but you can't vote for your own candidate.** When they've finished, tally the votes and announce the winning president.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

In this activity, how did you decide which kind of person would get your vote?

Is it okay to look up to people? Explain.

When might looking up to someone be taken too far?

What's the difference between looking up to someone and worshipping someone?

Say: Voting for presidential candidates is important. Even when someone is in a position of great respect, we can be careful to keep God at the front of our lives. Today we're going to talk about what it means to worship. We'll explore why ▶ ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. There are lots of things, people, and ideas that try to get the best of our time or respect, but we can make sure God is at the front of our lives. We're going to learn about a time the Israelites really messed up and put something else in God's place. Let's find out more.

Jealous Worship

What You'll Do

Have kids get into groups of four. Distribute Bibles, pens, and this week's Bible Buzz pages.

Say: Have you ever thought about what might happen if we chose not to worship God and to worship instead a god that we created? Let's look at a situation the Israelites got into when they worshipped another god—one they created.

Ask groups to read Exodus 32:1-25, and assign one of the following two roles to each group: a person who does what Aaron says to do or a person who refuses to do what Aaron says. Have groups write a few sentences supporting their position in the "Aaron or Moses?" section of their Bible Buzz pages. As kids read, have them stop after every five verses to record a few of their thoughts in their Bible Buzz pages.

When groups have finished, have the Aaron supporters go to one side of the room, and have the Moses supporters go to the other side. Have groups present their opinions about why their leader is best. Each time one group gives a good reason, one person from each side of the room will hop across the room and back. The first person to make it back to their original team will win, and his or her team will gain the person from the other team. A new person must participate in the race each time.

Continue as time allows or until kids give all of their answers. Then declare the team with the most kids to be the winning team. The winning team gets to have the losing team do one really silly task. Allow time for kids to choose what the losing team has to do, and then have the losing team do that thing.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

In what ways was your loyalty to your team affected by being moved from one team to another? How can team loyalty be like or unlike worship? Explain what choices you think people make in deciding to worship someone or something today.

Explain whether you think there are different things competing for your admiration and worship.

How do you decide which things and people to admire or follow?

Say: The things the Israelites chose to worship may not seem very tempting to us, but then again, the things we give our worship to also might've seemed

Who We Worship Supplies

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Bibles Bible Buzz pens strangely unworthy to the Israelites. When we're surrounded by other people who are following certain things, sometimes those things or people can appear more desirable. Whatever the reasons are that we get distracted from worshipping God, we can be sure that ▶ ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. God deserved the Israelites' worship, and he's still the only one worthy of our worship today.

Who We Worship

What You'll Do

Have kids return to their groups of four, and make sure each person has his or her Bible Buzz page, a pen, and a Bible.

Say: Find a partner in your group. Spend a minute sharing something you really like about yourself with your partner.

Have kids find the "Who Is God?" section on their Bible Buzz pages.

Say: We can get to know God just as we get to know one another. God has a lot of dimensions, and if we're going to worship God, we need to study aspects of him. Let's do that now.

Encourage groups to choose at least one attribute from the "Who Is God?" section. Say: Look up the verses listed for the attribute you chose. As a group, decide on a way you'd like to worship God for this attribute. Worship God together based on the attribute your group examined.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

In what ways did this experience deepen your understanding of God? In what ways is getting to know God similar to or different from getting to know another person? How do these attributes help us understand God?

Which of God's attributes help you know to worship him?

Say: Getting to know God is a little different from how we get to know people because we're never on even footing with God. He's always God, and we're always human. But knowing God can have greater meaning to our lives than knowing any person. God is always able to take care of us, he always cares, and he's always there. No person can do that for us. The Israelites were afraid for a lot of reasons, and they allowed that fear to cloud their judgment. That led to them worshipping something pretty silly. We've looked at why ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP, so let's worship God now.





Why We Worship

What You'll Do

Read aloud the Key Verse from Exodus 20:2-3: "I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. You shall have no other gods before me."

Say: The Israelites chose to worship a false god. We may not worship false gods in the same way, but we do let things in our lives get in the way of worshipping God.

Have kids sit alone and think of some things in their lives that get in the way of their devotion to God. Say: **These cards will be seen by others, so keep that in mind.** Give each preteen three index cards and a pen. Ask kids to write down one thing on each card.

Choose a few kids to collect all of the index cards when kids are done. Say: We're going to do a responsive reading. I'm going to say some things and then you'll respond with one phrase of a way you can remind yourself that ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. As you attempt to do the responsive reading, have the kids who have the index cards read very loudly from the cards.

Say: Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. (Pause after reading each line.) Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs. Know that the Lord is God. It is he who made us, and we are his; we are his people, the sheep of his pasture. Enter his gates with thanksgiving and his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name. For the Lord is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through all generations.

Have kids find and collect their own index cards from before. Say: That didn't go very well. Let's spend the next few minutes worshipping God and letting him have the things in our lives that distract us from worshipping him with our lives. Think of one phrase you can use to remind yourself that ▶ ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. Write your phrase across the back of each index card.

Play "Reflective Music" (track 12 on the CD). When the track ends, read the responsive reading below, having kids respond to each line with the phrases they wrote on the back of their cards. Kids can respond out loud or silently. Encourage kids to think about the obstacles they wrote on their index cards as they do this activity. Then read each sentence, and allow time for kids to respond.

Say: Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. (Pause after reading each line.) Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs.

Say: God desires our worship, and ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP. The Israelites allowed themselves to become distracted, and they worshipped something they'd made with their own hands. Praising and thanking God are important parts of showing our worship. He also cares about our needs and problems. Let's continue our worship of God throughout the week with this focus.

Say: Let's think this week about how we can remember that ► ONLY GOD DESERVES OUR WORSHIP.



The Israelites Build the Tabernacle

Exodus 35:4-36:38

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Generous Offerings

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It was time for the Israelites to build a portable dwelling place for the worship of God. When Moses asked for contributions, the people gave generously. Apparently the events of the previous months inspired them to give to God. They may have realized how they had wronged God in worshipping the golden calf and wanted to do what they could to make amends for the damage done. They gave so generously that eventually they had to be told to stop bringing more materials (Exodus 36:6-7)!

One might wonder where these former slaves got gold and fine cloth to donate to the Tabernacle. The answer lies in the generosity of the Egyptians as the Israelites were escaping. God told the Hebrews to ask for things from the Egyptians; the Egyptians responded with silver, gold, and clothing (Exodus 12:35-36).

Talented Workers

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Not only did the Hebrews give things, but they gave time and talents as well. This passage singles out Bezalel and Oholiab as the leaders of the workers and also mentions women skilled in spinning goat hair (Exodus 35:26) and other skilled and willing people (Exodus 36:2).

Willing Worship

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What can we learn from this event? Serving God involves all kinds of different tasks and abilities. If you can't build a structure, maybe you can spin cloth. If you can't sing, maybe you can tell a co-worker about Jesus. Each one of us has God-given abilities and spiritual gifts. God wants us to use what he's given us to serve and honor him in whatever ways we can. God can use anyone to serve him and to further his kingdom here on earth. The only thing stopping our service to him is ourselves.

The Jesus Connection

Our relationship with Jesus gives us daily opportunities to serve him. He is our friend, our Creator, and our Savior. Service is a choice we make on a daily basis. But how often do you analyze your motives for serving? Wrong motives can rob us of blessings and limit our effectiveness in service.

For the Christian, service comes out of thankfulness for salvation and devotion to honor our Creator. If we are not serving for those reasons, perhaps we're really self-serving. Write a prayer here asking God to refine and hone your heart as you serve today and each day going forward.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids turn to the "Help Wanted" section. Say: Take a few minutes to think of two jobs you'd like to hire someone to do for you. It could be anything from a chore you don't enjoy doing to a superherolike task. Write two want ads. Allow a couple of minutes.

When kids are done with their want ads, have them tape their Bible Buzz pages to a wall with the want ads showing. Give kids a minute or two to look over the want ads and choose which ones they'd like to apply for. Have kids spend five minutes walking around and interviewing each other for the jobs they've posted. Talk With Kids

Ask:

How did you decide which jobs you wanted to apply for? What were your primary criteria in choosing a person to hire? What's one way you can make yourself available to do jobs for God?

Say: Having meaningful work is important. As you get older, you'll get the chance to apply for jobs, and maybe you'll even get to hire other people. Thousands of years ago, many of God's people pitched in and built a special place to worship God while they traveled in the desert. Let's look at how they served God as we discover that ► WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD.





Help Wanted

What You'll Do

Say: God wanted the Israelites to build a Tabernacle—a place that would remind them that God was always with them. The Tabernacle would be a beautiful tentlike structure where the Israelites would meet with God. To make it, God used the skills and gifts of every person in the giant group of Israelites.

Distribute paper and pens. Have kids form pairs, and make sure each pair has a Bible. Ask pairs to read aloud Exodus 35:4-9, pausing as they notice the types of things God is asking the Israelites for and writing down their observations. Then have the pairs continue with Exodus 35:10-21, looking for the skills God's asking for and writing them down.

When they're done, have pairs write their own résumés, using God's requests for their résumé. Say: Use the questions on the "My Gifts" section of your Bible Buzz pages to help you determine what should go on your résumé to help build the Tabernacle. God asked people for their gifts, so include what you could give to God. God asked people for their skills, so include your skills, whether you're artistic, musical, mathematical, or skilled in writing. God asked people for their strength, so list things you can do because of your strength, whether sports or other hobbies.

Now that you've looked at what your skills are, take some time to determine what you could do with your skills and gifts and strength to contribute to God's **Tabernacle.** Have partners help each other write a résumé based on the skills and gifts and strengths they listed earlier.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Thinking of your résumé, what do you think you could do to serve God? Why do you think it's important for each person to be part of God's plan? Explain what you think of the fact that some people want to do things you don't enjoy doing.

Say: The Israelites served God by building a Tabernacle. \blacktriangleright WE ALL CAN SERVE GOD, too. He's prepared each of us with skills and abilities that are unlike anyone else's. We enjoy different things and can each play a different part in God's work. Let's see how we can do that.

Moses Sends Spies Into the Promised Land Numbers 13:1-14:23

K ids this age are beginning to perceive themselves as people capable of bravery. They're able to realize that they can stand up for what they believe, and they're beginning to really value bravery. They may look up to someone who's brave. They'll recognize superheroes and other such prominent people as brave people. Use this lesson to help kids realize that bravery doesn't have to mean huge gestures—they can be brave for God by standing up for what's right.

Moses Sends Spies Into the Promised Land Numbers 13:1–14:23

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

Your Mission, Should You Choose to Accept It...

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The spies were sent on an exploratory mission. The purpose was to see what kinds of opposition they'd be facing and if the land could support the Israelites as they conquered it. Moses' instructions were clear: They were to explore the land from the southern end all the way to the northern end.

Mission Impossible

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When the spies first returned, they simply reported what Moses had asked for. They told of the fruitfulness of the land, the powerful people, and the fortified cities (Numbers 13:26-29). But after Caleb spoke his mind, the other spies went beyond what they had been asked to do. They began to lament that there was no way they could defeat the people in the land. They exaggerated the reports of the size and strength of the land's inhabitants. The people responded by once again rebelling against Moses and against God. Once again God threatened to strike down all the people and begin again with Moses. And once again Moses interceded for the faithless Israelites.

The Faith of a Mustard Seed

Moses pointed out that what the Egyptians had learned about God through their recent experience would be nullified if God allowed the Israelites to die in the desert. Moses wanted everyone, including the Egyptians, to see God's power.

God once again forgave the Israelites. But notice he imposed a harsh punishment: No adults who were alive during the rebellion—except Joshua and Caleb—would be allowed to enter the Promised Land. Joshua and Caleb had faith that God could do what he said he would. Their faith enabled them to stand up for God, even when it was not the popular thing to do. Although their courage didn't convince anyone else to have faith, they were rewarded.

The Jesus Connection

Jesus Christ stood up for the world through his atoning sacrifice on the cross. Through our relationship with Christ, we can stand up for what we believe and who Jesus is.

Throughout history and all over the world, people have died because they professed a faith in Jesus Christ. While most of us do not experience persecution to this degree, non-Christians can be resentful of our claims to know the truth. These confrontations put Christians in a difficult situation.

Think about non-Christians you regularly come in contact with. Are you the same person with them that you are in front of this Sunday school group you're teaching? On the lines below, write a prayer that you will stand up for Jesus in your interactions with non-Christians.

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went. When everyone has arrived, have kids form groups of up to four.

Say: Choose one person from your group to select one of the situation cards I'm holding. In your groups, choose a freeze frame to show your card. Don't worry about how you'd respond. We'll get to that later. I'll give you just one minute to prepare, so work quickly. After one minute, I'll point to each group to indicate your group's turn to make a freeze frame.

Have willing kids from each group select a card; then give groups a few minutes to prepare. Randomly select groups to present their situations. When all groups have presented, distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids find the "Roll Film" section.

Say: Think about how you could personally respond to the situation your group acted out earlier. In "Roll Film," there are two parts. In the first, write the first thing that comes to your mind as a response. Then discuss the situation with your group, and record the group's response in the second part.

Give groups a few minutes to discuss and record responses.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Did your decision change after your group discussed the situation? Why or why not?

How does what others think affect your decisions? What kinds of situations have you been in that are similar to these? What do you typically do to make decisions in tough situations?

Say: Many times we plan to be brave and make good decisions but are swayed by the opinions of others. It's not just us who face that kind of challenge. It also happened to some Israelite spies—some who were brave people and some who weren't. Let's explore what happened and find out why it's important to ► BE BRAVE FOR GOD.





Extra! Extra! Spies in the Land

What You'll Do

Have kids find the "Spies in the Land" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Form four groups. Assign each group to one of the four parts of the Bible passage on the Bible Buzz pages. Invite groups to collect their supplies.

Allow 10 minutes for groups to follow the instructions on their Bible Buzz pages. Then help groups present their sections in chronological order.

Talk With Kids

Lead groups of four in this discussion.

Ask:

What about this passage showed you a way you can be brave for God in your own life? What does it take to stand up and be brave enough to do what's right even when you're the only one? What's the most important thing about being brave for God?

Say: God rewarded Caleb and Joshua for standing up for what God had promised them and the Israelite people. Most of the other spies and the people weren't willing to stand up, and they paid a terrible price—forfeiting their right to enter the new land God promised. We may not be about to enter the Promised Land, but there are plenty of situations in our lives in which we can choose to ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD.

Reflection" section of your Bible Buzz pages. You can use the questions there to help you process and reflect. Draw an abstract drawing, or write a paragraph. You have four minutes. Allow time.

Say: Think of a time you were like the brave spies and did the right thing even if you were the only one doing the right thing. Represent this picture too. Allow four minutes.

Have kids get back into their groups of four from the "Please Stand Up, Please Stand Up" activity. Have groups take a minute to discuss their pictures or paragraphs and the differences between being brave for God and doing what everyone else is doing.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was the main difference in the two situations you represented? When have you seen something in your life that shows that the right thing to do isn't always the popular thing?

What can you do to help yourself focus on what God wants instead of being focused on what everyone else is doing?

Say: You illustrated the difference between fear and bravery as God sees it. Your examples might help you see the times in your own life that you can be bold and brave for God. When we decide to ▶ BE BRAVE FOR GOD, that means following him no matter what. The Israelites weren't all brave, and a small number of people went against everyone else to be brave for God.

Say: Let's think this week about how we can **BE BRAVE FOR GOD.**

Balaam's Donkey Talks

Numbers 22:1-38

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

The Fortuneteller

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This event takes place near the end of the Israelites' time of wandering in the desert. They had defeated a few adversaries in their travels and were approaching the Promised Land again. The leader of Moab was afraid of what Israel might do to his land, so he sought the help of Balaam.

Apparently Balaam was a widely known fortuneteller, or diviner, who made his living through his divination. He probably believed in many gods and would consult anyone, including the Lord, who could help him earn his fees.

A Wrong Motive

Even though Balaam called upon the Lord and spoke God's words to the people sent by Balak, Balaam's underlying motive was for selfish gain.

When God had told Balaam "no" the first time, Balaam should have taken that as a final answer. But when Balaam came back to God a second time, it was clear that Balaam's desire for financial gain was greater than his desire to do what God told him. In letting Balaam go but not letting him do anything that would please Balak, God was showing how he disliked Balaam's money-hungry attitude.

God let Balaam go with Balak's men, but God was angry because he knew that Balaam was acting from self-interest and greed.

A Talking Donkey?

Not being able to see the angel his donkey saw must have been a huge insult to Balaam, who prided himself on knowing and seeing spiritual things. Certainly Balaam was humiliated when the donkey had to speak in order to get him to see reality. Balaam had been blinded by his desire for riches. God finally opened his eyes to the angel standing in the path and to the evil of what Balaam had been doing.

Speaking God's Words

After getting Balaam's attention through the donkey and the angel, God let Balaam know that he wanted Balaam to go through with his trip but to speak only what God said. This whole event was intended to help Balaam think clearly and to know that he had to do what God told him.

The Jesus Connection

God is always doing things in us and through us, but we can sometimes forget that and stop paying attention to him. When we let our focus stay on God, we can be used more easily by him. Write the most recent thing you can remember that helped you see God at work. Ask God to help you pay attention to him in the big and small things in your life. You can write your prayer on the lines below.

sometimes wait for someone to pay attention, this guy was in just the right place to really do a lot of damage to God's people, the Israelites. So God went to some pretty epic lengths to get Balaam's attention. He used a donkey.

Have kids form pairs. Allow a minute for each partner to come up with a really exciting story to tell his or her partner. Once kids are ready to tell their stories, say: **All right**, **get ready to amaze your partner! The only catch is that you have to tell your story without using any words.** Allow a few minutes, and then get kids' attention.

Say: We're going to read about a situation in the Bible in which someone was in danger because of his own stubbornness. The problem is that the only one who could warn him about the danger wasn't able to speak.

Ask kids to form trios and find the "Amazing Results" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Provide pens and Bibles, and have kids turn to Numbers 22:1-38.

Say: There are lots of people in this passage—and they all seem to want something. Look at the "Amazing Results" section. You'll see there's a roster of the people in this passage. As a trio, use the column on the left to dig into this passage and decide what each of these people wanted. Jot that down in the appropriate column. Then decide if they were amazed at the results they saw. Make a mark to also indicate whether you're amazed.

Ready? You have 15 minutes. Begin now.

After 15 minutes, ask trios to report their insights back to the larger group.

With their trios, have kids tell a true amazing story from their lives. Say: When you tell your story this time, you can use words, just like Balaam's donkey was able to tell what was going on using words. Allow a few minutes. Then have kids talk about a time in their lives they needed to pay attention to God. Allow a couple of minutes.


Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

God put this information in the Bible for us. Why do you think it's so important that we know what happened with Balaam and his donkey? Explain what you expect when you tell someone an amazing story. What's the difference between telling someone something when they're paying attention to you and when they're not? What about this experience makes you want to pay closer attention to God?

Say: An amazing thing happened when God caused Balaam's donkey to speak – and it was impressive. Balaam was stunned. God sometimes does amazing things to get the attention of people who aren't listening (like Balaam). If God did something that amazing when someone wasn't paying attention, just imagine the

Say: Tell a partner about someone you pay attention to. This could be someone at school who you admire or an older sibling or friend. Tell your partner why you pay attention to that person.

After kids have shared with a partner, ask them to find another partner. Say: **Share with** your new partner one way you think you could pay attention to God the same way you pay attention to people you admire. Allow time.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What's different or the same about paying attention to God and paying attention to people you admire? What things most often distract you from paying attention to God? What's one way you want to make the time to focus on the amazing things God's doing?

Say: God did something as outrageous as making a donkey speak just to get Balaam's attention. Once God had Balaam's attention, he used him to bless the entire nation of Israel. We can give all of our attention to God. When we let him have all of our attention, we can find out what amazing things he'll do in our lives. We can ▶ PAY ATTENTION TO GOD when we get rid of other distractions.

Joshua Becomes Leader of Israel

Joshua 1:1-11

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God With You

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As we begin this passage, Moses had died and Joshua had taken over the leadership of the Israelites, as had been arranged in advance (Deuteronomy 31:1-8). Joshua 1:5 tells us that God was going to be with Joshua in the same way he had been with Moses.

God at Work Through You

The question may arise: Why was it okay for the Israelites to kill other people and take away their land? This is a complicated question. However, one point seems apparent: God was using Israel to judge the immoral people who lived in the land at the time. Just as Israel was later defeated and their land taken away because of sin, so God was using Israel as an instrument of punishment, taking away the land of the Canaanites because of their sin.

God's Plan for You

In this passage God gave Joshua a command of encouragement ("Be strong and courageous"), a condition for success ("obey all the law my servant Moses gave you"), and a promise of his presence ("the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go"). God had a plan for Israel, and Joshua was the instrument through which he was going to accomplish that plan.

God Goes Before You

What more could Joshua ask for? All he had to do was follow what God laid out for him, and God would be there to assure his success. However unsure or discouraged Joshua might have been at the death of Moses, this visit from God rejuvenated him. The first thing recorded after God's message to him is Joshua's ordering the leaders to get the people ready to cross the Jordan. The Israelites were ready to move into the Promised Land, and God was going to give them the land.

The Jesus Connection

Our plans and God's plans don't always match. We want to be happy now; God wants to give us greater joy as we surrender our lives to his service. When we commit our lives to Christ, he uses us to accomplish his mission. God promises the same thing to us that he promised to Joshua: He'll be with us all the time. On the lines below, write a prayer about one area of your life in which you need to know God is with you.

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Road Trip!

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Set out the "Where Do You Want to Go?" map. After kids have arrived, have them gather near the map.

Say: Welcome to the Plan It Cheap Travel Agency. You're now travel agents, and you are going to plan a road trip for us. Since we're a cheap agency, we'll have to plan our road trip using this map that doesn't have any names printed on it. And I'm afraid you won't get any outside help.

Have kids get into groups of up to four. Give groups paper and pens.

Say: We'll be leaving from here and need to end up in [choose a destination on the map that is far from your location]. It is up to you to decide what tourist stops we will see along the way, so plan out what you want to see along the route and how you will get there.

Give groups five to eight minutes to complete their travel plans.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like doing this activity? How was using a map without names frustrating? What could I have given you to make your planning simpler? What kinds of things do you plan for? What would change about making your plans if you knew God was with you as you made those plans?

Say: It was difficult for you to make plans for our trip without a more specific map. Many times we can't accomplish our plans on our own, so we need help. Today we are going to learn about a time God made big plans for Joshua and how God helped him accomplish those plans. We'll explore how ► GOD IS WITH US no matter where we go.





Not Your Average Puppet

What You'll Do

Distribute this week's Bible Buzz pages, pens, and pieces of yarn. Have kids form pairs, and make sure each pair has a Bible. Say: In your pairs, choose one person to be a Puppet, and the other person will be a Puppeteer. Take a couple of minutes to tie some pieces of yarn to the hands and fingers of the Puppet. Allow time.

When kids have attached yarn to their partners, have them find the "Not Your Average Puppet" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Say: **Puppeteers, hold the pieces of yarn and try to gently guide your partner's hands to trace the words "God Is With Me" on the "Not Your Average Puppet" section. Puppets, behave as a regular puppet and let your hands be limp.** Allow a few minutes for kids to try to get their partners to trace the phrase.

Say: Perhaps this didn't go too well. Let's find out what might be the same or different about when ► GOD IS WITH US and helps us do things. Let's read about what God promised to Joshua.

In their pairs, have kids read Joshua 1:1-6 together. Say: What could you change about this activity to show what God promised to do for Joshua? Decide a way you think you could get the other person to trace "God Is With Me" on the page. Encourage partners to talk together and decide what they might be able to do that would be more like what God did with Joshua. If they need suggestions, consider ideas such as having the leading partner place a finger on the page where he or she wants the partner to trace or tell the partner each step of how to make the letters.

Have kids switch partners. In each pair, one child will be "Joshua" and the other will be "God." Encourage kids to look at the Bible passage to find ways God promised to be with Joshua. When kids are ready to show a different example of how God led Joshua and how he leads them, have pairs take turns demonstrating for the group. Then have kids read Joshua 1:7-11 together.

Say: God asked Joshua to do something really big. It was exciting but also probably really shocking. Joshua could've been afraid, but he listened to God. God said he'd be with Joshua, and that was all he needed to know.

Have kids take a few minutes alone to write a personal memo to God in the "Please Be With Me" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Encourage kids to write about the promises they saw in the Bible passage that they want to see God apply to their lives as well. Allow a few minutes.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

In what ways is it easy or difficult to believe that God is with you in the same way that he was with Joshua and other people in the Bible? What makes it easy or difficult to remember God is with you all the time? What's the most encouraging thing about knowing God's with you all the time?

Say: God had big plans for Joshua. He made Joshua the leader of Israel, which was not a small task. Joshua took on the task with courage, though, because God promised to be with him and help him. We can do whatever God asks us to do, too, because ► GOD IS WITH US.

What You'll Do

Say: There have been many young people who have relied on the fact that God was with them to give them courage. We get to carry forward that legacy and trust God to be with us all the time. That fact can change our lives if we let it.

Have kids get into groups of three. Say: **Tell about a time you faced a difficult** situation. When you're done, your group members will tell you ways it seems like God was with you through that situation. Allow a few minutes.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Lesson 10

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- In what ways did it encourage you to hear someone else's story and see how God was with that person?
- What changes about your perspective when you focus on the fact that God is with you?
- In what ways can you help yourself maintain focus on the fact that God is with you?

Say: ► GOD IS WITH US just as he was with Joshua. Our stories can encourage us to trust God. When we turn to God before we worry about new situations or challenges, just as Joshua did, we can bypass all that stress and worry. Knowing God is with us doesn't stop the hard times from coming, but it does make us able to face those times.

Have kids stand up and read from their Bible Buzz pages the Key Verse, Joshua 1:9, together: "Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be terrified; do not be discouraged, for the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go." Encourage kids to read the Key Verse aloud again, this time adding their own motions to help them remember the meaning of the verse.

Distribute copies of the lyrics, and have kids sing along as you play "Wherever You Go" (Joshua 1:9) (track 14 on the CD).

Have kids find the "God Is With Me" section on their Bible Buzz pages and follow the directions there to reflect on God's presence in their lives. Some kids will get further through the directions than others, and that's okay. This isn't a competition, and each person will have a unique experience. Allow four minutes. Then ask kids to sit together.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

When are you really glad to have God with you? Explain. Why does it make a difference if you acknowledge that God is with you? In what ways can you openly invite God to be with you in all aspects of your life?

Say: God is with us all the time, but he can lead us more easily when we pay attention to his presence in our lives. We can trust God just as Joshua did, and we'll see the difference it makes to follow God rather than ourselves. We can be thankful that ► GOD IS WITH US.

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think this week about how we can remember that > GOD IS WITH US.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

Joshua Sends Spies to Jericho

Joshua 2:1-24

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

A Different Method

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As Joshua prepared to send spies into the Promised Land, no doubt he remembered the fiasco of 40 years earlier when Moses sent a large group of spies into the land. This time Joshua sent only two and gave them a very specific mission: Investigate Jericho. He sent them "secretly," not wanting the Canaanites to know what they were doing and probably also to protect the Israelites from the distressful result of the first spy mission.

Good Gossip

It may seem suspicious that the place the spies went was to the home of a prostitute. However, it's likely that this was a place where gossip would abound. In addition, the word most often translated "prostitute" can just as accurately be translated "innkeeper." Either way, it was a place where the spies were able to hear and gauge how the people of Jericho felt about the Israelites who were camped just across the Jordan River.


A Woman of Faith

Rahab, though she lied about hiding the spies in her house, had apparently become a believer in God through what she had heard about the Israelites' experiences and conquests. She hid the men at great personal risk. She was commended for her strong faith in the New Testament in Hebrews 11:31. Note that God did not commend her for lying but for acting in faith and hiding the spies. God blessed her for that faith.

The end of this event lies beyond the scope of today's passage. During the victory over Jericho, Rahab and her family were indeed spared from death (Joshua 6:17). Moreover, the New Testament attests to her faithfulness and includes her in the line of King David and of Jesus (Matthew 1:5)!

The Jesus Connection

Rahab's faith landed her among Jesus' ancestors. When we venture forth with a small act of faith, God responds and shows us his much larger faithfulness. In what areas of your life would you like to show more faithfulness to God? What are some ways you've seen God's faithfulness to you? You can write your prayer asking God to use you to do big things. There's nothing too big for the God of the universe who wants to lead and guide your life.

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went. Form groups of four or five, and distribute pens and this week's Bible Buzz pages.

Say: The Internet is full of half-truths and blatant lies. Take five minutes to talk about some unbelievable videos you've seen on YouTube or other places on the Internet. Some videos are staged, others are raw footage and are funny, while others are carefully produced to create a reaction. Share what your favorite videos are and what about them you believe or don't believe. Allow about five minutes.

Say: Now switch gears and create your own short "video" with your group. Figure out what the components are for a viral video, and then create one of your own. Use the "Write Right Here, Hear?" section on your Bible Buzz pages to jot down ideas. After five minutes, have kids present their viral videos to the rest of the group.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

- With so much Photoshop and video editing, what helps you know when you can believe something?
- Explain whether you agree or disagree that making a viral video is a big deal.
- What makes it seem like a viral video is a really big deal?
- Do you really believe that a viral video matters? Explain.
- What are some of the biggest things you can think of that you hope you can do with your life?

Say: The world around us is full of things that are promised but not fulfilled. That means we tend to like things we know we can trust. The best place we can put our faith is in God. ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES. Let's learn about some people in the Bible who made some bold choices to have faith in God.





Unexpected Faith

What You'll Do

Say: Joshua wanted to conquer the city of Jericho, but he didn't know much about it. He sent two spies who apparently weren't very good spies—because after entering the city, they were discovered. And not only were they discovered, but they were trapped. Jericho was a walled city, so once the gates were closed, there wasn't any way for the spies to escape. Their capture was just a matter of time until they received help from a very unlikely source.

Have kids find the "Great Big Things" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Set out markers, paper, rulers, and Bibles. Say: Look at the picture in the diagram on the "Great Big Things" section, and draw part of the image you see there on a piece of paper. Use a ruler to make a box that's 8x8 inches on your piece of paper. Assign parts of the image to kids, making sure each section gets done. Say: Look at Joshua 2:1-11, and talk about the big things God did as you color your square of the picture of Rahab. Allow 15 minutes for kids to read and draw their pictures.

When kids are done with their drawings, have them work together to cut the blank space off each of their pages and tape the pictures together so they match up. As they do this, read aloud Joshua 2:12-16. Then hang the picture up so they can admire what their pictures look like all together.

When it's all finished, have a willing preteen read Joshua 2:17-24 aloud.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to work on a small piece of this giant picture and then see the entire thing come together?

In what ways was that like or unlike how God does big things in our lives? What different things do you notice when you're far from the picture and when you're close to it?

What intrigues you about God using a woman like Rahab to help his people? What about this passage helps you believe that God can do big things with you?

What's one way you want to have more faith in God?

Say: ► WE CAN HAVE FAITH THAT GOD WILL DO BIG THINGS IN OUR LIVES. The Israelite spies had faith that God would give them the land. Rahab believed God was powerful and that he was blessing the Israelites, and she acted on her belief. Now let's look at how we act on our faith.

Faithful Words

What You'll Do

Ask kids to form trios.

Say: God makes a lot of claims. If we say we believe what God says about himself, he can do great big things with us. So we have to ask ourselves which things we hope God will do with us and ultimately leave it in his hands. He can accomplish our dreams or do something even bigger. He made the whole world, didn't he?

Have kids find the Key Verse, Hebrews 11:6, on the Bible Buzz page, and ask a willing preteen to read it aloud: "And without faith it is impossible to please God, because anyone who comes to him must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who earnestly seek him."

Say: God rewarded Rahab for her faith. But this verse also says we need to seek him.

Ask:

How do you need to seek God?

Have kids find the "Because God IS, He Can Use Me To..." section on their Bible Buzz pages. Make sure kids have Bibles and pens.

Say: In your trios, take turns reading the Bible verses listed. Then write next to the verse how you do or how you want to act on what you believe this verse is saying. For example, if the verse is saying God is powerful and mighty, you might write how God can use his power and might to transform your life. Each person will have time to complete two verses. When you've finished, share your responses in your trios. Discuss whether you have faith in what the Bible says and, if so, what you'll do to act on your faith.

When five to eight minutes have passed, ask for willing kids to share what they wrote. Affirm every answer. When there are no more willing kids, ask kids to share in their trios their answers to the following questions.

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

How does your view of God influence what you believe he can do through you? What do you think you can do to let God do big things with you? Think of the biggest thing you hope you can do with your life. Explain how you think that dream could be bigger because of God. The Israelites Cross the Jordan River

Joshua 3:1-4:24

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Guides a Nation at the Jordan River

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Parts of this event may seem like a rerun of the Israelites' crossing of the Red Sea 40 years earlier. Remember, however, that apart from Joshua and Caleb, all of the people crossing the Jordan River were no older than children when Israel crossed the Red Sea. This totally new experience must have reminded them of the stories their parents had told them about the miracle of crossing the Red Sea.

Notice that the Jordan River was not just a trickling stream—it was at "flood stage." In the area of Jericho, it would have been 10 to 12 feet deep and the current quite strong.

Israel Memorializes God's Miracle

The Israelites built a stone memorial with the rocks taken from the center of the Jordan River. The memorial would remind people of the wonders God had done for the Israelites as they entered the Promised Land, and the 12 stones together would remind them of the 12 tribes joined together as one nation.

The last verse of today's passage, Joshua 4:24, tells us why God dried up the Jordan for the people to cross: "so that all the peoples of the earth might know that the hand of the Lord is powerful and so that you might always fear the Lord your God." God wanted his people to fear him—to give him the worship and service he deserved. Remembering what God had done would give them encouragement and faith when they faced the difficulties of conquering this new land.

The Jesus Connection

As we grow in relationship with Christ, we become more Christ-like. We can testify that we have been renewed and delivered from our different lives of the past.

Reread Joshua 4:24. Note the public display of power that God left as a reminder of his love and power. In times of darkness, it's often helpful to rest in the truth of what we have experienced in the past. Encounters with our Savior remind us that he is with us. Write a prayer of thanks for the ways God has been present in your life. When you talk to God this week, start by thanking him for these great things, and add to the list as God continues to work in your life. You can write your prayer in the lines below.

Thanks, But No Thanks...

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Form two groups of equal size. Participate in one group if you have an uneven number of kids. Have groups sit on opposite sides of the room. Have each group number off so it has only one of each number—each will have one 1, one 2, and so on. Go to one group and quietly say: **Spend the next minute or two thinking of something kind to do for someone. When time's up, you'll each go to the person from the other group with your number and do that kind thing for that person.**

Go to the other group and quietly say: The other group is going to do something kind for you. When they do that, make it as difficult for them as possible. Then pretend to forget what they've done. Tell them things like, "I really wish someone would do something nice for me."

After about a minute, tell the first group to go do their acts of kindness for the people with the same number. Allow about four minutes for kids to perform their acts of kindness and for the other group to react.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Is it realistic to believe someone could forget something kind that was done for them just a second before? Explain. Why is it important to remember the good things that happen? How does that relate to the things God has done? Why does it matter whether we remember the things God has done?

Say: God has done amazing things for each of us. Just the fact that the sun comes up in the morning and we're able to continue living each day is a great thing, and then if you add the other things on top of that, we have a lot of amazing things to remember. God did something amazing for a man named Joshua and the Israelites in the Bible. Then the Israelites made special memorials to help them remember the things God had done for them. We can do things to help us ▶ REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE, too.





Prayers and Praise

What You'll Do

Say: God promised the Israelites that they would enter a new land. The only thing standing between them and the new land was the humongous Jordan River—at flood stage. Joshua was confident God would lead Israel to the new land. But what about the Israelites? Imagine you're an Israelite during this time. Let's explore what happened.

Distribute Bibles, pens, and this week's Bible Buzz pages, and have kids turn to "The People's Prayer" section. Form groups of three, and have kids in each group number off from 1 to 3. Have them read the corresponding sections of the Bible passage and fill out the prayer activity there. Say: Follow the instructions on your Bible Buzz page, but when you write, leave out every fifth word. Allow about five minutes.

Ask:

Looking at your writing, explain what difference it made to forget some of the words. What does that show you about the problem with forgetting things?


When kids are done, have them share what they learned with their group and (if they want to) how they related the passage to their own lives.

Say: No doubt the Israelites had heard about how God parted the Red Sea when Israel escaped from Egypt. Now God had parted the Jordan River for them. Let's read about what happened next.

Have kids form new groups of three and find "The People's Praise" on the Bible Buzz pages. Have kids follow the instructions there. Each person in a group will have a different passage. Give one washable marker to person 3 in each group. Allow about five minutes.

When they finish, have kids show their group what they came up with and then decide together how they can praise God for what he did for the Israelites in each section. Have kids act on their decisions. If they choose to praise God by singing and shouting, have them do that. Allow about five minutes. As they work, display the "Jordan River" poster, and set markers and tape near it.

When groups finish demonstrating their three ways of showing praise, have them each cut out rock shapes from gray paper and write a word of praise on each rock. Kids can make as many rocks as the number of words of praise they can think of. Allow a couple of minutes. Then have kids go to the "Jordan River" poster and stick their words of praise to the poster.

When they're done, direct kids' attention to the poster, and read some of the praise words.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Explain how you think prayer and praise work together when you're facing something you need help with.

When we praise God, how does that help us remember what he's done? How does prayer help us remember to thank God?

Say: Look at all these ways we can ► REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE! God loves to hear our praises. Let's think about how we can remember the great things God has done in our lives. Just like it's important for you to remember the good things you've done, it's even more important for us to remember the amazing things God has done. God did some incredible things for the Israelites at the Jordan River, and that same amazing God is with us today.

Our Altar of Remembrance

What You'll Do

Have kids find the "My Thanks" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Provide pens, and have kids each find a place they can work alone.

Say: Let's take some time to remember what God has done for each of us. You'll have six minutes to fill in the lines on the "My Thanks" section. Don't stop to think; just fill in the lines as quickly as you can. You'll see a letter at the beginning of each line. Think of something that begins with that letter for each line. Ready? Go!

Allow about six minutes. As kids work, play "Give Thanks" (1 Chronicles 16:8) (track 15 on the CD). You may want to play it twice so that it takes up the whole time kids are working.

Once everyone's finished, provide paper bags and newspapers. Show kids how to make paper-bag stones by stuffing newspaper inside one bag and placing another bag over the first, closing off the open end. Then have kids use markers to write on their paper stones one thing God's done that they want to remember and be thankful for. You can encourage kids to list one item from the "My Thanks" section.

As kids work, say: The Lord had Joshua build an altar with stones from each of the 12 tribes as a way for Israel to remember what God had done for them. Let's build

an altar with these "stones" to help us remember what God has done and is doing in our lives.

Have kids build the altar by stacking up the bags and taping them together with masking tape. After the altar is completed, stand around the altar and encourage willing kids to pray about ways they want to remember the things God has done, whether in the Bible or in their own lives.

When you finish praying, sit around the altar together.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What was it like to think of things you might've previously overlooked and forgotten to thank God for? What is it like to realize you've forgotten to be thankful for something? What difference might it make for you to focus on remembering the things God has done?

Say: Thankfulness can change our lives from the inside out. When we replace our concern about ourselves with thankfulness, things begin to look different. Joshua and the Israelites knew that thankfulness depends on being able to remember what God has done, so they built an altar. We can start off our thankfulness by focusing our attention on remembering what God has done. It's important that we ► REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE, too.

Daily Challenges

What You'll Do

Say: Let's think this week about how we can ► REMEMBER WHAT GOD HAS DONE.

Have kids find this week's Daily Challenges on their Bible Buzz pages and choose one to do this week. They can choose one or more of these three options:

Make a collage of the things you can remember and thank God for. Keep creating the collage as long as you can remember things God has done. When you're done, sit down with a parent and thank God together for the things he's done.

Write sticky notes of things God has done that you want to remember. Place the sticky notes on your bathroom mirror. When you see them, thank God for those things and ask him to help you keep your focus on his goodness.

God Gives Victory Over Jericho

Joshua 6:1-27

P reteens are just discovering what power really is. They're at the beginning of the adolescent transition from being completely parented to being a little more independent. An important part of that transition is gaining an appropriate sense of personal power and how to use it. The best way for kids to learn this is through looking at God's example. Kids can model their use of power after God's—and get their power from him. Use this lesson to help them understand God's power and how it works for good.

God Gives Victory Over Jericho

Joshua 6:1-27

BIBLE BACKGROUND FOR LEADERS

God Promises Victory at Jericho

Archaeologists have found the site of ancient Jericho but are still uncertain which city is the one delivered into the hands of the Israelites because it has been destroyed so many times. In light of the curse put upon Jericho in Joshua 6:26, the archaeological findings are interesting indeed.

Joshua Receives a Message From God

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While scouting out the city, Joshua was no doubt surprised to see a man with a drawn sword in front of him (Joshua 5:13). We don't know if this was an appearance of God himself, a preincarnate appearance of Jesus, or an angel; however, we do know that he was someone sent from God. Notice how the messenger responds to Joshua's question: "Are you for us or for our enemies?" The messenger was the commander of the Lord's army. It was up to Joshua and Israel to be on the Lord's side, not for the commander to be on Joshua's side!

In the middle of God's message to Joshua, the writer stops to mention a very important fact in Joshua 6:1: The people of Jericho had closed up their city, counting on its strong fortifications to protect them. It was so firmly sealed that no one could go in or out. This meant that no one from Jericho would get in the way as the Israelites marched around the city walls!

God Fulfills the Promise

Notice that God not only told Joshua what to do but also told him precisely what would happen (Joshua 6:5). Assuming that the word from God spread among the Israelites, imagine their increasing anticipation as the army marched silently around the city day after day and then seven times on the seventh day. The people knew that God was about to do something spectacular! Just as promised, Rahab and her family were spared because of the faith she had shown in hiding the Hebrew spies. God's power worked to save her and the Israelites, while at the same time it was working to destroy the inhabitants of Jericho for their idolatry and immorality.

The Jesus Connection

A relationship with Jesus allows us to walk in confidence, as his power of forgiveness has given us freedom. His love for us provides us with what we need to be clean in his perfect eyes.

Take a few minutes to write down as many words of prayer as you can that show the character of God. Each day, meditate on one of these characteristics and how God has shown those characteristics in your life. Give God praise, and acknowledge God's mighty work in your life.

Power to Celebrate

What You'll Do

Welcome kids warmly as they arrive, and ask them how their week went.

Say: We're going to have a party today. It will be sort of a celebration of the way we've experienced power in our lives. Let's get ready for the celebration by decorating our meeting area.

Distribute party decorations, and instruct kids to decorate your meeting area. Have kids work together to create a large "Power Party" banner with construction paper and markers, taping together their pieces of construction paper. Kids can hang the banner in your meeting area along with other party decorations. While you decorate, play "Celebration Music" (track 16 on the CD), repeating it as many times as necessary.

After the party scene has been set, have kids find partners and sit together.

Say: Let's use a question to help us celebrate the powerful things around us: What are some things you consider powerful? Whenever someone answers this question, we'll all celebrate that powerful thing. Our celebration can be packed with power, too. We can be really loud, jump and run a lot, or even turn on extra lights. Think of powerful ways to celebrate. Give kids balloons to use in the celebration as they throw a big, loud party for a few minutes.

As kids think of powerful ways to celebrate, have them do those things. As more and more kids join in, this will become a rambunctious, power-packed celebration.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

What are some of the best uses of power that you see every day? Explain whether you think power is mostly a good thing or a bad thing. What makes you think you can trust God's power?

Say: We've all experienced different kinds of power in our lives. Today we're going to celebrate ways ▶ GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD in our lives. Let's take a look at how God showed his power in a specific situation in the Bible. God has a lot of power. He's stronger than we could ever imagine.

Power Cartoons

What You'll Do

Show kids the "God Gives Victory Over Jericho" picture on the Bible Timeline.

Have kids sit, and distribute paper, pencils, Bibles, and this week's Bible Buzz pages. Say: Find the "Power Experience" section on your Bible Buzz pages. I'll tell you which section of the Bible passage we're looking at, and I can read it aloud to you, or if anyone else wants to read any of the sections aloud, you are welcome to do so. After someone reads each section, you'll use your blank paper and pencils to draw a frame of a cartoon about what's going on in that scene. When you hear the next section, you'll create a new frame in your comic strip. Show kids the outlines on their Bible Buzz pages in the "Power Experience" section. Tell them that they'll be tracing parts of these images and adding their own elements to make their cartoon images. They'll need to have between one and three components from Bible Buzz in each frame. They can fill in details around these traced images.

Take kids through these verses, pausing for them to modify their drawings after each new section is read.

After kids have had a chance to hear and see the Bible passage in their own illustrations, say: Find a place by yourself. Draw yourself into your cartoon, and pray that God will do mighty things in your life. Allow time.

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

How do you think changing your picture each time relates to the way God's power shows up in our lives?

In what ways was having to rely on these traced drawings like or unlike the Israelites conquering Jericho?

How did you see yourself fitting into today's Bible passage?

How do you think we can see God's power today like the Israelites saw God's power when he knocked down the walls of Jericho?

What's one area of your life in which you need to see God's power at work? Considering the ways God's power worked for good in this passage, how does that help you see God's power in your life in a different way?

Say: Like the Israelites, we're going to proclaim God's power seven times. I've set up seven stations throughout our room.

Have kids find the "Power Station" section on their Bible Buzz pages. Allow kids to look over this section and decide which stations they want to go to first.

Say: At each station, find the appropriately numbered statement on your Bible Buzz pages. Using the paper and pens at each station, show how God's power has worked in your life in the situation described on the Bible Buzz pages. You don't have to just write or draw; you can fold origami to tell your story or use the supplies in any other way. I'll let you know when you have just a few minutes left.

Allow 15 minutes for kids to move between the stations at their own pace. Have kids leave their representations of God's power that they complete for each station at that station. Give kids a five-minute warning and a one-minute warning.

Ask kids to sit together.

Say: There's a lot of power represented in your words and pictures. The Israelites celebrated God's power as they marched around Jericho. ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD.

Have kids find the Key Verse, 1 Peter 5:6-7, on their Bible Buzz pages: "Humble yourselves, therefore, under God's mighty hand, that he may lift you up in due time. Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you." Say: **Talk with someone next to you about something that makes you anxious.** Allow a minute. **Now discuss how you can cast that anxiety into God's mighty hand.** Allow about a minute.

Ask a willing preteen to read the verse aloud, and then have kids repeat the verse a few times, cheering and yelling to celebrate at the places where the verse shows God using his power for good. Kids might stop at the word "mighty" or perhaps at "lift."

Talk With Kids

Lead kids in this discussion.

Ask:

Which station has the most representations of God's power? Why do you think God's power might seem to show up some places more than others?

What's your typical reaction to some of the ways God shows his power? In what ways would you like to change your reaction to God's power?

Say: We've just seen a lot of ways ► GOD'S POWER WORKS FOR GOOD. Joshua and the Israelites were in the middle of a pretty amazing miracle as God showed his power to his people. God's shown power in our lives, too. We can thank God and celebrate his power all the time because his power is always present.
